Husband Has Wife Jailed for Posing To Him as Baroness

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) COLOGNE, Germany, Aug. 17 .- A deception that began more than six months before the start of the war, and that was successfully practiced until this month, has just been discovered. It might never have been unearthed if it had not been for the war.

In the winter of 1913-14 a local engineer met and fell in love with a woman named Maria Schiedock. In the hope of interesting the engineer the woman had posed as u widowed baroness, the daughter of a preminent German general. When the engineer at last proposed marriage his fiances could find no way of rectifying

On the plea that the general would be terribly angry to find that his daughter had married beneath her rank, the couple went to London and there were married. The engineer on several occasions wrote letters to the general, but his wife was able to intercept each of the message. and to write answers calculated to keep

Then came the war and, eventually, the engineer's participation in it. He had never given up hoping that he would some day be able to bring about a meeting and a reconciliation with his titled and distinguished father-in-law. When he received the Iron Cross for bravery recently be decided that the proper time had come and once more wrote the general to tell him of the distinction.

This letter the general did get, and this time the engineer got a genuine answer, in which the officer angrily and very decidedly disavowed any daughter or any son-in-law. The deeply disappointed en-gineer could not find it in his heart to forgive his wife, but instead had her arrested on a forgery charge, which has just resulted in her being sentenced to prison for eighteen months.
