## ANDERSON FIRST ON ELGIN COURSE

Cooper Finishes Second, with O'Donnell Third and De Palma Fourth.

ELGIN, Aug. 21.—G.H. Anderson, driving at an average speed of 77.35 miles an hour for 201 miles, won the Elgin national trophy today. Earl Cooper was second; Ed O'Donnell, third, and Ralph De Palma, last year's winner, fourth. The race between De Palma and O'Donnell for third place was so close that for a few minutes the result was in doubt. Anderson's time was 3:54:25.

The leaders finished as follows: Anderson, 3:54:25; Cooper, 3:57:23; O'Donnell, 3:58:21; De Palma, 3:59:23.

ELGIN, Ill., Aug. 21.—Over a course made heavy and dangerous by last night's drenching rain, fourteen drivers were ready to pilot their machines in today's 30-mile automobile race, the final event of the two-day meeting.

The race was for the Elgin National trophy. Prizes totaling \$5,000, will be awarded to the first three who finish, \$2,000 to the winner, \$500 to second and \$300 to third place.

Ralph De Palma, winner of the event in 1921 and last year, was the favorite, although Earl Cooper, who rode to victory yesterday, was expected to give the noted Italian driver a desperate race.

Before the start the withdrawals of Alley and Patrick were announced, leaving twelve starters. The contestants were sent away at 11 o'clock, thirty seconds apart in the following order: Jones, De Palma, Henderson, Anderson, O'Donnell, Cooper, Oldfield, Chandler, Robillard, Burt, Henning and Buzane.

Cooper Takes Lead. At fifty miles the leaders, with their elapsed time, ranked as follows: Cooper, 2:11; Anderson, 2:30; De Palma, 2:40; O'Donnell, 2:58; Chandler, 3:18; Buzane, 3:28.

By making the fastest lap of the meet, 56.24, Anderson at 100 miles attained a lead of two seconds over Cooper. At this stage the leaders ranked: Anderson, 1:18:25; Cooper, 1:18:37; De Palma, 1:19:38; O'Donnell, 1:20:38; Oldfield, 1:23:37; Chandler, 1:23:26; Buzane appeared to be out of the race.

On the eleventh lap, by prearrangement, Brown relieved Jones as a driver. It was stated that Jones would resume later and drive the last 100 miles of the race.

Standing at 150 miles: Anderson, 3:54:49; Cooper, 3:57:23; O'Donnell, 3:58:21; De Palma, 3:59:23. None of the leaders had stopped at the pits up to this time, but at 175 miles Anderson used thirty-three seconds in taking on gasoline and oil.

Robillard was disqualified on the tenth lap because of the dangerous condition of one of his wheels.

Henderson Drop Out. The leaders did not change positions in the next fifty-one miles. At 201 miles the leaders were: Anderson, 3:54:49; Cooper, 3:57:23; O'Donnell, 3:58:21; De Palma, 3:59:23. Anderson's average was 77.42 miles per hour.

Henderson dropped out at 150 miles with a broken time gear.

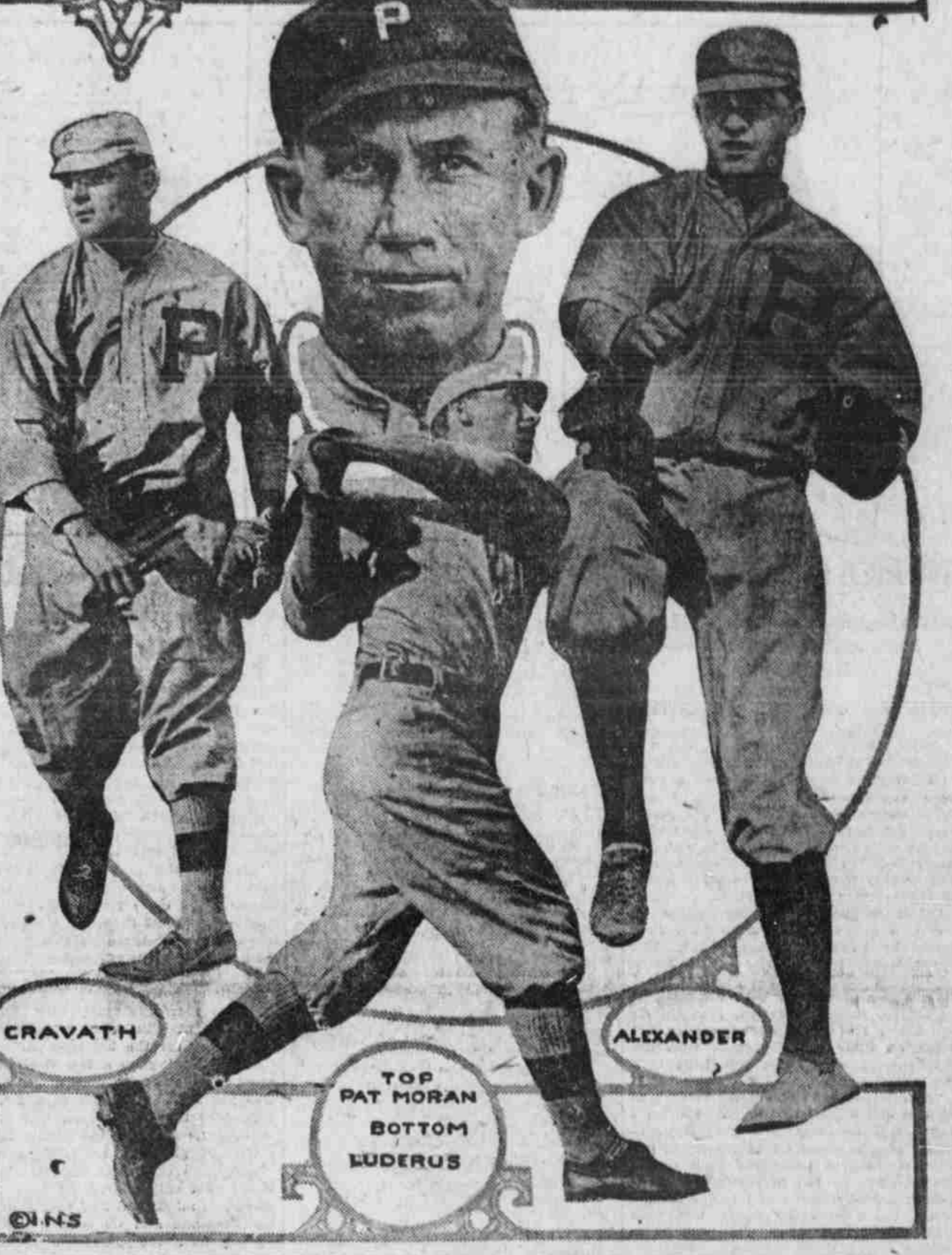

## TURF INTERESTS LEAD M'COY HERE

Famous Driver is in Omaha and May Locate Here—Entries Come In for Fall Meeting.

## NEW TRACK IS GIVEN PRAISE

By G. K. MURRAY. Omaha's glories of the past on the harness turf were recalled last week when Scott McCoy, who has trained and driven to records hundreds of good horses, arrived here for a stay of several days.

McCoy, who formerly raced numerous well known horses, is one of dozens of horsemen who have been "stopping off in Omaha" since the news went out that this city is on the map again with a bunch of live wires backing the sport here.

McCoy has been out of the horse business since his engagement with Littleton stock farm at Washington, Pa., terminated, but like all the other men of his type, finds it impossible to stay out. The tension of the reins and the companionship of horses are, as necessary to his happiness as a violin to a man who has spent his life playing that instrument.

McCoy may remain in Omaha. Two or three local patrons of the sport are advising him to start training horses here and be looking rather favorably on the idea. He is recognized everywhere as one of the most capable mechanics in the business and Omaha horsemen would be glad to welcome him as a permanent resident of this city.

McCoy once started out from Omaha with a 4-year-old pacing stallion purchased in this city, and in a few weeks made the colt the fastest 4-year-old pacing stallion in the world. The horse was Winslow Wilkes, 2:09, which later became a successful sire.

It was Emmet G. Solomon, now deputy county treasurer, who gave Winslow Wilkes his first speed lessons. The Solomon family was then prominent in the horse business in Omaha.

Horsemen should not forget that entries for Omaha's second race meeting of the year, which will be held at the County Fair association's track at Benson, will close September 1. This meeting promises to be highly successful and a nice new plant awaits the incoming trotters and pacers. The races will be held during the county fair the fourth week in September.

The track is a half-mile oval, and although it is new, the soil at Benson is "fast dirt" and the track is being used regularly for motorcycle and automobile races. The result probably will be that the Benson oval will be as fast as any in the state when the horses race over it in September.

The Fair association is charging horsemen 2 per cent entrance fee, with the customary 5 per cent additional from money winners. The purses are \$60 each. This is 3 per cent less than is usually charged at meetings on this scale.

Arthur C. Thomas, editor of The Horseman, and spirit of the Times of Chicago, an excellent turf journal, is interested in Omaha's revival of harness racing. Mr. Thomas formerly was a resident of Benson; was editor of Benson's local newspaper, and conducted a printing and publishing house in Omaha, which was known to horsemen all over the United States, until he went to Chicago to become editor of The Horseman. He is a son of A. L. Thomas, the noted driver.

Mr. Thomas in a letter addressed to the writer of these paragraphs, writes some kindly words of praise for this department and remarks that the first work which he ever did for a daily newspaper was for The Bee when he was secretary of the old Tri-City Amateur Driving club, about twelve years ago.
