SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—Princess Prem Kahr, the Maharane of Kapurthala, the favorite wife of the Maharajah of Kapurthala, who is visiting the Pan-American-Pacific exposition, has become a devotee of the tennis game and is daily seen on the courts. Before her marriage to the Maharajah, Princess Prem Kahr was a Spanish dancer. Her royal husband, one of the wealthiest of the petty rulers of India, met her in a dancing cafe in Madrid. She is the seventeenth wife of the Maharajah, but the only one of the seventeen who accompanied him to this country. In India, the princess plays polo and golf, but she has few opportunities to play tennis there.

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OMAHA'S BIG LINE RACE HORSES SOLD

Peterson Disposes of Hal Boy for Second Highest Price for Pacer of Present Year.

LOE BLOSSOM'S PATHETIC TALE

Ed Peterson's sale of Hal Boy, 2004, one of the star Grand Circuit stake pacers of the year, for \$11,500 last week, was an event second only in importance to the transfer of the champion, William, for \$25,000. No other pacer save William has been sold at a higher price this year.

The sale temporarily displaces Mr. Peterson from his position of premier Omaha patron of the harness turf. He recently sold the trotting mare, Loe Blossom, and just now has not a single line which is racing.

Hal Boy was sold to S. P. Fletcher of Indianapolis. Dick McMillan drove him in his race last week, but it is understood here that the question as to which teamster is to have him permanently is still undecided. He may go into the stable of Tommy Murphy.

Hal Boy won sixteen races out of seventeen starts, most of which were in the Canadian northwest, last year. His campaign included a \$100,000 event at Winnipeg, which he won, and a series of \$1,000 stakes. He first appeared at the races in 1913, when he got a mark of 2:34.

Hal Boy is an 8-year-old bay gelding, bred in Oregon and sired by Hal B., 2004, dam Altalena, (also dam of Sunny Jim, p., 2:14 1/2 etc., by Altamont 2:20 1/2, son of Almont 2:34).

Factor in Year's Classes. The horse has been a factor in the most important pacing stakes of the year, in spite of the fact that he has the best of racing manners, has been a little bit unlucky in that he has fallen just short of the highest honors. For instance, although he won the last two of five heats in the \$30,000 race at San Francisco, he had to take second place, and in the classic Chamber of Commerce at Detroit, although he was second in the second and under the point system last second money.

Ten Thousand Misses a Thousand. Along with the sale of Loe Blossom goes a story, a tale of gloom, of pathos and of sadness. Briefly, it is this: Ed Peterson refused to take \$10,000 for her in June and sold her in August for \$1,000.

Loe Blossom was entered in the \$30,000 trotting race at San Francisco. She had shown great speed and had several fast trails to her credit. No suspicion that she was a failed animal was in existence.

"I'll give you \$10,000 for that mare," said Len McDonald of Indianapolis to Mr. Peterson.

"Why, I couldn't think of taking \$10,000 for her," was the reply.

Time went on. Loe Blossom started in the big race and in other events and trampled on her owner's perfectly good entrance money. She made breaks just when she ought to have remembered that she was a \$10,000 mare and that she was supposed to come to the wire pulling on the bit and carrying large loads of purse money.

"Sell that mare for \$1,000," Mr. Peterson recently told Trainer Childs, and it was done.
