LIVED SIXTY YEARS IN STATE

Captain W.A. Bell, 4821 Underwood avenue civil war veteran and a pioneer of Nebraska, died at St. Joseph's hospital shortly after midnight...

Death is believed to have been caused by a fractured skull. An inquest will be held after an autopsy has taken place.
