NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Widely Divergent Conditions Keep it in an Unsettled State Early.

IMPROVEMENT COMES LATER

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—Widely divergent conditions helped to unsettle today's market and kept it in a state of ferrment during the early session, with general improvement later. Further debasement of British, French and Italian exchanges to the lowest quotation ever officially recorded was counterbalanced by the news that Germany had compiled with this country's protests to the extent of abandoning her policy of marine warfare. This news was followed by a sharp rebound at prices.

In banking circles, however, there was no disposition to minimize the effect of the increased demoralization in international credits. Demand bills on London fell to \$4.50, an overnight loss of 5½ cents, and Paris checks at \$5.09 represented a loss of 5 cents, or 4 cents under any rate hitherto quoted, while lires at \$5.9 fell 5 cents under all previous rates. In the afternoon marked improvement was noted, stering actually recavering in full at one time, while france regalised 8 cents to \$6.61. Italian exchange hardened in sympathy, but the day's developments offered freeh proof of the immediate need for remedial measures.

There was a marked increase of bond and stock sales for foreign accounts. Open selling embraced some of the inactively held abroad. According to reports large amounts of these and similar American securities have recently bean absorbed here at private sale.
