Daniel Longwell of 213 South Twenty-sixth avenue and Paul Nicholson of 1824 Capitol avenue hold the honors of serving as umpires through a championship series of playground ball games without one instance of rowdiness. They umpired the games between the teams of the seven supervised recreation centers, under the direction of Superintendent English. In scoring these games language and conduct of the players were considerations. Points were taken off for swearing, calling names, losing temper or for other forms of rowdiness. These umpires imposed no penalties for slang expressions, although they did not approve of slang. Saying "Dern the Luck" during these games was not regarded as an egregious offense. The remark, "O You Book" was overlooked by Umpires Longwell and Nicholson. These young umpires attend Central High school. They did much to improve the esprit du corps at the recreation centers. They served as examples as well as umpires and Mr. English expects to retain them for next season. Superintendent English has presented Masters Longwell and Nicholson medals for their efficient services as official umpires during the inter-park series.

Travers and Ouimet Defeated in Second Round at Detroit

DETROIT, Sept. 1.—America's two leading golfers were eliminated from the national amateur championship tournament at the Country club this afternoon. Francis Ouimet, holder of the amateur title, lost to James D. Standen, Jr., of Detroit, 5 down and 4 to play and Max R. Marston of Springfield, N. J., triumphed over Jerome Travers, open champion, 3 and 1. Ouimet played poorly, making his drives and missing short putts. Marston's putting was almost perfect.
