

Nebraska MELLOR SEES HOSTS ATTENDING FAIR

Spends Time Supplicating Weather Man to Give Week of Clear Weather. JUDGE HAMER IS ON THE MEND

LINCOLN, Sept. 2.—(Special.)—The state fair next week promises to eclipse all former shows if the weather man will only be good and hold off his rain-drops until after the boys and girls have visited the exposition at Lincoln and have seen all the wonders of the Golden Rule show.
