

### PROF. REED IS HELD FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Former Omaha Principal Kills Boy with His Auto While Driving at Louisville.

### LAD JUMPED BEFORE WHEELS

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 3.—(Special Telegram.)—William Branch, 12 years of age, was struck and almost instantly killed this afternoon by an automobile, driven by Prof. Clayton E. Reed, principal of the Male High school.

The accident occurred at Logan and Broadway, and eye-witnesses state it was unavoidable.

Prof. Reed, who came here from Omaha, only a few weeks ago, to take charge of the boys' consolidated high school, was arrested on a charge of manslaughter.

Prof. Reed was driving the car when the accident occurred.

Prof. Reed tonight said: "I am heartick and distressed over this unavoidable tragedy. As I approached the crossing I sounded the horn several times. The boy evidently did not hear. He jumped from the rear end of a passing car and before I could apply the brakes he was directly in the path of the machine. At the time I was running the car only at moderate speed."

Prof. Reed tonight was released on bond of \$5,000, signed by Dr. L. W. Bloom, member of the Louisville Board of Education.

### Many American Boys Who Enlisted Sent Home from Britain

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 3.—More than 200 American boys under 18 years of age have been discharged so far from the British army upon requests from the State Department. Most of these boys went to Canada and misrepresented their ages to recruiting officers.

Peter Douglas of Lambert, Minn., after having been discharged once upon the application of the State Department, escaped from his parents and re-enlisted. He was released again, only to take passage on the Arabic and escape death when that liner was sunk by a submarine.

The Walsh twins of Boston, though only 15 years of age, also managed to enlist twice and the last time were found on Salisbury plain just about to be embarked for France.

### Final Count Places Number of Victims of Eastland at 812

CHICAGO, Sept. 2.—Final tabulations compiled and made public today by the census office show that 812 persons lost their lives when the steamer Eastland, with 1,600 on board, capsized in the Chicago river July 24.

According to the figures of this number 44 were women and 261 men. Of the total 226 were married. Ninety-eight of the victims were under 16 years old.

### O'CONNOR SPEKS TO PROVE SWINDLER IS IN THE TOILS

FREMONT, Neb., Sept. 2.—(Special.)—County Clerk John O'Connor, awindled out of \$1,000 by Henry G. Fisher, arrested at St. Louis after he had escaped from jail at Waukesha, Wis., reached the Missouri metropolis Wednesday morning, too late to see the man who fleeced him out of his life's savings. Fisher had been taken to Waukesha, Wis., the night before Mr. O'Connor arrived.

Mr. O'Connor went to St. Louis to see the prisoner to satisfy himself that the man who walked off with his money was in custody. He will also make an effort to get possession of some of the property Fisher is said to own. Mr. O'Connor writes to Sheriff Condit that Fisher is not the Arkansas City, Ark., banker, John W. Barnhardt. Fisher for several years operated a saloon in St. Louis under the name of Barnhardt. Fisher, alias Kieme and several other names, is wanted at Waukesha for assault with intent to commit murder.
