## Expect Corn Crop Over Two Hundred Million Bushels

General Manager Walters, who made a trip over the company lines last week for the purpose of noting the condition of the corn crop, has since received reports from all the agents of the com pany within the corn growing area of Nebraska. From these reports and his own observations he has made some calculations on what the corn crop of Nebraska will be this year in the event as September 20 or 25. Said Mr. Walters: "If the frost holds off until September 30 or 25, I confidently believe the Nebraska corn crop this year will approximate 200,000,000 bushels, which will be a bumper in the history of the state. With a late frost everything points to

"I have been looking up the yields since and find that we can fall con-siderably under 200,000,000 bushels and still gather a bumper crop.

"In 1907 Nebraska raised, 173,000,000 bushels of corn; in 1908, 169,000,000; 1909, 178,-600,000; 1910, 133,000,000; 1911, 164,000,000; 1912, 90,000,000; 1913, 165,000,000, and 1914, 171,-

"I have been here during all these years of the past and have noted the condition of corn each year, and have no hesitancy in saying that with the exception that corn is a little late, it is better and more promising than at any time in the past.
