Superintendent's Directions to the Principals Bar Rod Unless Written Consent Filed.

LIBERAL RECESSES THIS MONTH

In connection with the opening of the public schools next Tuesday Superintendent Graff has addressed a circular to the principals, setting forth various matters of school administration and referring at length to the new course of study.

Under the beading of "Corporal Punishment" the superintendent writes: "There is to be no corporal punishment in the schools under my jurisdiction without the written consent of the parent or guardian.

This instruction must be followed without exception. If a parent wishes a child corporally punished by a teacher, he must file his written consent for such pointsh ment with the teacher and even then I consider such corrective men the jurisdiction of the teacher. She should not be called upon nor requested by any parent to correct his child in this way. However, I wish to add that this does not mean that we to'crate any sort insubordination. The discipline of our schools is to be kept up to the lighest posable standard. If a child is given the privilege of receiving instruction, he must seport himself in such a manner as to merit his receiving it or he should not be allowed to remain in school."
