These letters have been piling up in Vera Cruz for the last month since it was ecessary for the military to use the mly available telegraphic lines to the prejudice of the general public while the siege of the capital was being carried on. It is not the want of food of a material kind that the foreigner feels so keenly here, but the want of that intelectual nourishment which comes from the news centers of the world in the shape of press dispatches and in the editorial comment and magazine articles on the same. Papers bearing a date a month old have been eagerly read during the last few weeks. With the large English, French, German, American and Spanish colonies here the dearth of European war news works a real hardship.
