COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 23.—Pronounced favorites not only won the four races on today's Grand Circuit program, but they did so without the loss of a heat. Not a driving finish was seen. The time average was the best of the week, and Etawah found the track good enough for the lowering of his record, the Goers harness finishing the mile in 2:05 flat after having gone the first half in less than a minute. A breeze hindered him and all the other horses through the last quarter.

Queen Abbas, winner of the 2:10 pace, showed her quality when she stepped the final heat in 2:04. 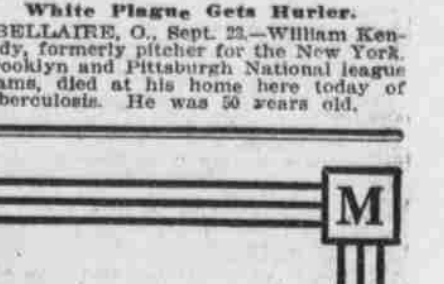
