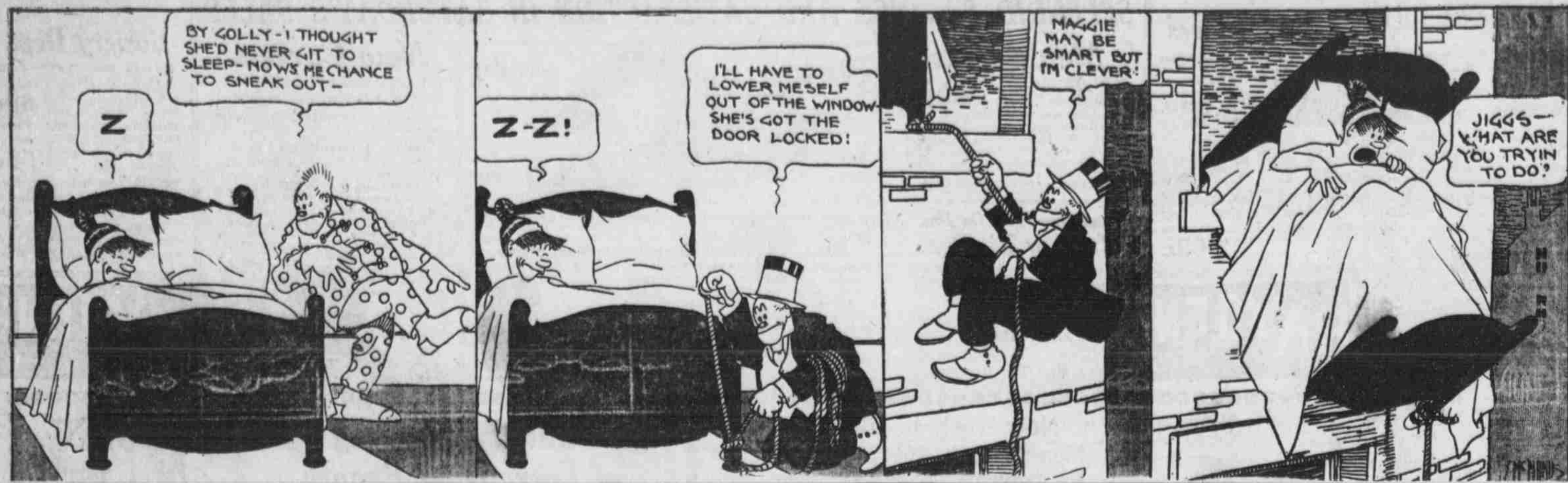

BOSTON, Sept. 24.—The Red Sox string of successes stopped at seven, when St. Louis outplayed the league leaders at every stage today and won 5 to 4. Three times previously this season Boston has won seven straight games, only to lose the eighth.

It was a contest of heavy hitting, in which the Browns battered Ruth from the box in the third inning and piled up seven runs off Gregg in the seventh.
