Education Board Will Co-operate in Recreation Plan

Chairman Jenkins and W. A. Foster of the teachers' committee of the Board of Education have been designated as a special committee to work out a plan for proposed co-operation with the Recreation board in connection with recreational activities in the public school social centers. The teachers' committee held a special meeting yesterday afternoon, with Superintendent English of the Recreation board and Supervisor Ennor of the public school social extension department in attendance. There seems to be a disposition among members of the teachers' committee at this time to co-operate with members of the Recreation board. Superintendent English's plan is that the school board authorize the use of five to eight schools, three evenings a week, for five months, the school officials to furnish light, heat and janitor service and the Recreation board to provide supervisors. Miss Ennor recently was appointed supervisor of social extension work by the Board of Education at a salary of \$1,500 a year, and it is proposed that she shall be given added duties and salary by the Recreation board.

T. L. Combs Quoted In Leslie's Weekly

Omaha's busy jeweler, T. L. Combs, has the plate of honor in this week's Leslie's for an extract from his address as president of the National Retail Jewelers' association. The particular paragraph, which is quoted at the top of the editorial page, reads as follows: "Politicians have had their day, held their sway, and killed their prey, and now it's time for business men to take active measures to prevent business starvation and political manipulation. MRS BESSIE RLY SUES FOR \$30,000 DAMAGES

As administratrix of the estate of John E. Rly, deceased, Bessie Rly, the widow, has brought suit for \$30,000 in district court against the Union Pacific Railroad company. Rly was a signal man in the employ of the company and on August 3 of this year was struck and killed by one of the company's trains at Waterloo. It is alleged in the petition of Mrs. Rly that her husband was riding a bicycle and in the discharge of his duties as a signal man. At Waterloo, August 3, within the town limits and when he was in the act of dismounting from his bicycle, the passenger train, running at a speed of thirty-five miles per hour, came along, caught and instantly killed him.

BREWING COMPANY FILES MOISE BANKRUPTCY SUIT

The Lelsy Brewing company yesterday started bankruptcy proceedings against Walter Moise, liquor dealer, in federal court. It alleged that he had twelve creditors. Moise declared that the bankruptcy suit was the result of a financial dispute between himself and the brewing company pending in other court proceedings. The company's claim amounts to \$13,000, while Moise alleges he has been damaged \$215,000 by the company.

OFFER ACCEPTED BY BRICKLAYERS

Strike Called Off and Men Will Resume Work on Five Jobs This Morning.

TO RECEIVE 72 1/2 CENTS HOUR

All bricklaying jobs, on which work was suspended a few weeks ago when a strike was called, began operation this morning.

The strike was settled last night, when a compromise was reached, and the bricklayers are to go to work this morning at 72 1/2 cents an hour and continue on that scale until December 1, after which time they are to receive the 75 cents they have asked for.

The builders appointed a committee some days ago and made this proposition. The bricklayers, at a special meeting last night, accepted it.

The wording of the agreement signed by the Omaha Builders' exchange and the striking Bricklayers' union follows: "OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 24, 1915.—To the Officers and Members of the Omaha Builders' Exchange, Omaha, Neb.—Gentlemen: We, the committee of the Bricklayers' union No. 1 of Nebraska, wish to announce that at a special meeting of the union held September 23, that we accept the terms of your organization, viz., to immediately return to work at 72 1/2 cents per hour until November 30, 1915. On and after December 1, 1915, 75 cents per hour in the future."

Need More Men. As many of the striking bricklayers left the city during the three weeks of the strike the Builders' exchange now announces that it will take 25 additional bricklayers to take care of the immediate demand on the many buildings now in process of construction and the many others on which contracts are to be awarded within the next few weeks.
