

### VETERANS AGAIN TAKE WASHINGTON

Advance Hosts of Grand Army of Republic Reach National Capital for Encampment.

#### WILL REPEAT GRAND REVIEW

WASHINGTON D. C., Sept. 25.—Abuzz with patriotic color, Washington welcomes today the advance guard of the fast fading union hosts coming to participate in the forty-ninth annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, which begins here Monday.

Thousands of veterans already have arrived and every train brings hundreds more who fifty years ago marched under the eyes of Grant and in the wake of Sherman in the greatest military review the world had ever seen.

Thirty thousand survivors of the historic march up Pennsylvania avenue from the capitol to the White house, which marked the close of the civil war, are expected to be here to commemorate on Wednesday that world-thrilling spectacle. In September, 1862, President Johnson bared his head to 100,000 triumphant heroes of the union army. President Wilson next Wednesday will greet those who remain after half a century to make the march again.

#### Hundred Thousand Expected.

Extraordinary preparations have been made for the encampment, because it probably will be the last Grand Army reunion in the capital. To this end plans for entertaining 100,000 visitors have been perfected and the event already gives promise of rivaling inauguration ceremonies in interest and display.

Flags are flying from a thousand staffs. The capitol, White House and every government building are draped with the national colors. The streets of the city are radiant lanes of red, white and blue as the throngs of guests and visitors arrive.

David J. Palmer, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army, and General Nelson A. Miles, retired, who will act as grand marshal of the commemorative review, are among the early arrivals. With them come scores of men who took conspicuous part in the war.

Although the grand review will be the most spectacular feature of the reunion, many interesting events are on the program for the celebration, which will continue until October 3. The War and Navy departments have co-operated with the citizens' committee to aid in entertainment of the veterans. Exhibition drills of regular troops are to be held on the Washington monument grounds. Secretary Daniels has arranged to have submarines, torpedo boats and other small naval craft unknown in civil war days here for inspection. There will be hydroplane and aeroplane flights and other features to illustrate the advance in warfare during fifty years.

#### Capital Takes on Martial Air.

The capital already has taken on the martial air that it is to parade it for the coming week. The streets are enlivened with veterans and members of organizations allied with the Grand Army, which also will hold reunions. Among them are the Sons of Veterans, the Loyal Legion, the Medal of Honor Legion, the Volunteer Officers' association, the Naval Veterans, ex-Prisoners of War, the Society of the Army of the Potomac, the Society of the Army of the Cumberland, Society of the Army of the Ohio, Women's Relief corps, Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic and Daughters of Veterans.

Upon their arrival today the veterans discovered that the reunion this year was not to be a tented affair. Heretofore headquarters of the various Grand Army departments at annual reunions have been established in tents, but headquarters this time have been provided in the old census bureau building, which has been adequately adapted for the purpose.

The main floor has been divided into two auditoriums, one of which will be held business sessions of the encampment and a general reception Tuesday night to be attended by President Wilson. The other has been set aside for camp fires and naval dog watches, which will be continuous features of the reunion.

On the second floor of the structure rooms have been provided for headquarters of the various corps of the military and semi-military organizations allied with it. Rest rooms, restaurants and a hospital also are provided.

#### Wearers of Gray Will Come.

With the veterans from many states who wear the blue have come wearers of the gray, specially invited for the occasion. Staff officers of the Confederate Veterans' union were extended invitations and arrangements for their entertainment have been made. This action was taken at the suggestion of officials of the Grand Army, the meeting of the blue and gray on the Gettysburg battlefield two years ago having given testimony of the amicable relationship existing between the two organizations. Invitations also have been extended to governors of all states and members of their staffs, as well as to a large number of distinguished officers of the United States, including members of the cabinet, who will review the soldiers with the president and members of congress.

The commemorative review on Wednesday will start from the Peace monument at the east entrance to the capitol grounds and proceed up Pennsylvania avenue through a court of honor in front of the White House. A huge reviewing stand has been erected there. Besides the veterans in line will be the Sons of Veterans, an escort of citizens and troops of the regular army, marine corps, sailors from the fleet, cadets and independent military bodies.

### UNION HOST WILL MARCH IN REVIEW

chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, have arrived. Among others who are here or expected by tomorrow are the following noted veterans:

General James H. Wilson of Wilmington, Del., and General Grenville M. Dodge of Council Bluffs, Ia., the only two living corps commanders of the union army; division commanders, General Adelbert Ames of Mississippi, General D. McM. Greig of Pennsylvania, General Lewis A. Grant of Minnesota, General J. Warren Keller of Ohio and Brigadier General John T. Wilder of Knoxville, Tenn. Nearly all the veterans who marched with Sherman and Grant who are enrolled for the line of march Wednesday have passed 70 years of age, and it is probable that another commemoration of the event never will be held.

The line of march for the parade will be from Peace monument at the east entrance of the capitol grounds, up Pennsylvania avenue and through a court of honor erected in front of the White House. With the president when he reviews the procession will be members of the cabinet, other distinguished officers of the United States, justices of the supreme court and members of congress. Besides the veterans in line there will be Sons of Veterans, various citizens' military organizations, troops of the regular army, marine corps and sailors from the fleet.

#### Parade Three Hours Long.

The parade, it is estimated, will require about three hours in passing. General allies, as honorary grand marshal of the parade, will have army and navy officers as his aides. Colonel Halsey, chief-of-staff to the commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, will be the active marshal. As special guard to Commander-in-Chief Palmer will be the U. S. Grant post of Brooklyn, N. Y. Veterans will march in their respective Grand Army departments, the line being headed by the Department of Illinois, which was the first to be organized after the war.

On Thursday and Friday business meetings of the encampment, with sessions of allied organizations, will be held. After the election of grand officers Friday the veterans will proceed to Arlington National cemetery, where President Wilson will lay the cornerstone of a new national amphitheater. Another feature will be a public reception in the capitol Thursday evening under the auspices of the Women's Relief corps. This organization, co-operating with the women of the Grand Army of the Republic, will plant two trees, one on each side of the boulevard leading to the Lincoln memorial in Potomac park. The first spadeful of earth in planting the first tree will be turned by Commander-in-Chief David J. Palmer, while Mrs. Sarah E. Fulton, president of the Women's Relief corps, will have that honor in planting the second tree.

#### Will Wig-Wag Message.

One of the events for tomorrow will be the wig-wagging of a message of greeting and good will to visiting veterans from President Wilson. The message will be signalled by men familiar with the old Myer code, which was sent from station to station about Washington by survivors of the signal corps of fifty years ago.

Signalling features of the encampment will continue throughout the week under charge of Lieutenant George Carr Round, president of the United States Veteran Signal Corps association. The main station of the veteran signal corps will be on the heights of Georgetown in the extreme western section of Washington and upon the spot where the government had its signal instruction camp during the war. Mount Taber Methodist church, which stands there, will be headquarters. From that point welcome will be wig-wagged and messages of peace and good will to the world are to be sent. Other stations are established at Fort Stevens, Fort De Russy, the National Soldiers' home, Fort Richardson and the dome of the capitol.

Secretary Garrison and Secretary Daniels have co-operated with the committees to entertain the veterans. Regular troops from Fort Myer are to give daily drill exhibitions on the Washington monument grounds, while submarines, torpedo boats and other small naval craft unknown to civil war times are to be on exhibition in Washington harbor in the Potomac.

### CORONER'S INQUEST FINDS NYSTROM NOT A SUICIDE

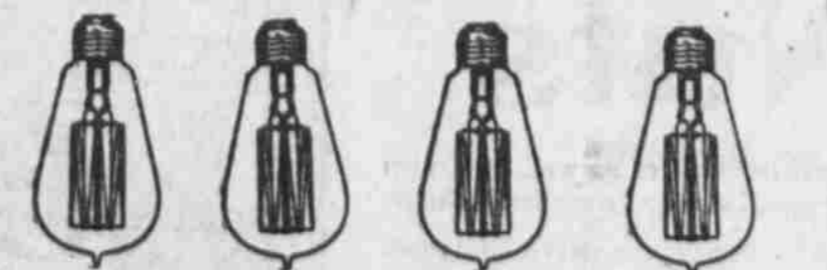
