


# HUSKERS TO MEET DRAKE SATURDAY

Mayor Dahlman and Mayor Bryan to Start First Game for the Nebraska Eleven.

# DRAKE MEN ARE ALL VETERANS

By JAMES E. LAWRENCE. LINCOLN, Sept. 25.-(Special.)-Ne-braska opens the 1915 foot ball season next Saturday with the hardest early season game in its history. Drake, a Missouri Valley conference team, will provide the Husker enthusiasts a test for the gridiron machine, which Coach Stiehm has been hastily whipping in shape the last week.

Athletic Manager Guy E. Reed today completed arrangements for the biggest opening day crowd in Cornhusker athletics. The Nebraska manager has arranged an especially attractive program for the inauguration of the 1915 season. Secretary Walter Whiteen of the Lincoln Commercial club, extending an invitation to th emembers of the Omaha city commission to attend the game, recelved a letter yesterday from Mayor Dahlman, stating that he and other Omaha city officials would be on hand for the game. Governor Morehead, the members of the Lincoln city commission and the members of the governor's staff also received invitations.

The Omaha city officials will be entertained at the Lincoln club at noon lunchcon as guests of the club, with the members of the Lincoln commission. Special boxes have been reserved for the visitors at the game.

Mayors in the Center. Mayor Jim and Brother Charley Bryan, mayor of Lingoln, are to stage the opening festivities. Just prior to the calling of the game Jim and Charley will advance to the center of the field, flip a coin to decide who will kick off and then the game will be on. Reed has added another feature, which

he believes will bring 1,000 Nebraska high school foot ball players to the game. In-Vations were sent out this week to 350 high schools in Nebraska asking the members of the teams to attend. Reed also arranged that every member of a high-school team who can present proper credentials from the superintendent or principals of the schools will be admitted tree. A special section of the grandstand has been reserved for the high school crowd.

For a half hour preceding the game the University Cadet band will give a concert. and during the halves a free vaudeville program will be given.

Coach Jumbo Stiehm has only a slim line on Nebraska's first opponent, but the Drake eleven will have the advantage of an additional week of training. Stiehm also has been informed that Drake has seven veterans in the lineup, which would indicate the Nebraska eleven will have to play real foot ball from the start of the gong.
