GIVES ADVICE TO YOUNG PREACHERS

Rev. "Billy" Sunday Talks at the Presbyterian Theological Seminary On the Ministry.

"Do as The Bee does," was "Billy" Sunday's advice to the young ministers whom he addressed at the Presbyterian Theological seminary Tuesday morning.

No, "Billy" didn't say exactly that, though he meant it. In this instance he referred not to the well known newspaper, but to the well known insect when he said:

"Do as the bee does. Make everything count toward your work. Gather honey from every flower. From the newspapers, from magazines, from conversation with people. In talking to a man just the other day I got the idea for a new sermon."

The evangelist spoke for less than half an hour, but in that time he drove home many strong points and did it in such a terse way and with such a wealth of homely illustration and apt metaphor that he had the theological students and professors laughing and applauding most of the time.

Exact Old-Fashioned Gospel. He warned them against the higher criticism and declared the old-fashioned gospel is what the people want and what God wants preached.

"A few years ago," he said, "a lot of churches were breaking their necks trying to get higher critics for pastors. Now those same higher critics are working out shoe leather looking for jobs. Nothing will draw the people like the gospel."

Have Definite Aim. "Some preachers," he said, "preach without any definite aim and they don't make the world any better, or even worse. It's as necessary to have an aim in preaching as in shooting squirrels."

Increase your vocabulary. Get hold of new words, and then take them into full membership in your brain without probation. A new word, like a new tooth-brush, doesn't belong to you till you've used it. Too many preachers are trying to make butter by milking a dry cow."

Be careful of criticism. He said, "No matter what you do, you'll be criticized. And some of the meanest things said about you will come from men who are themselves in good standing. Some of the meanest things said about me have been said by preachers. I go right on. I never could understand how Christian people who see the multitudes going to hell right beside them could criticize any man who is being used by God to save sinners from hell. I never could understand it."

Different Men for Different Jobs. "We don't all work alike. God makes use of men of many kinds. He used the sensitive, spiritual John in work where he didn't use the rugged, impulsive Peter."

"Billy" advised the preachers to get the best education they can, but not to hesitate if they have the call to preach. He caused great laughter and applause with this personal story:

"I never saw through a seminary in my life, but I was ordained a Presbyterian preacher, and made a 'D. D.' besides. I don't know why. I never asked for it and never gave anybody money to get it either."

Had Run Down Stories. Rev. Dr. Marshall, president of the seminary, presided. After "Billy's" talk he called on "Ma" and she responded by handing him a bouquet in this wise:

"I want to congratulate you on having a president with good sense. I know he has good sense because he investigated stories he had heard about Mr. Sunday and learned they were not true."

"I just court investigation of Mr. Sunday in every way. We can't stop stories from circulating, but you can always investigate them, and we are willing to let the Lord deal with those who circulate such stories."

BODY OF OLD MAN IS FOUND IN PARK

Note Found in His Pocket Indicates that He Intended to Commit Suicide.

HAS THREE BULLET WOUNDS

Carl Nygren, 5510 North Thirty-sixth street, while walking through Fontenelle park Tuesday found the body of a man about 60 years of age lying to the side of the path on a bed of newspapers. A .32-caliber revolver lay by the form, and later examination revealed the fact that three bullets had been discharged into the body near the heart. The dead man is five feet ten inches in height, weighs 150 pounds, has a brown moustache and was clothed in a grayish brown suit.

The following note was found in the apparel: "To whom it may concern: I am a sick man, not able to work. I had an operation on the kidneys, and have had such pains in the back for several years that I will be better off dead than living. I have no relatives, and am all alone, so goodly this world forever. Take my body to some institution for examination and bury me. I have no money to pay for my burial. I had to struggle in sickness for several years to make a living. Forgive me for this act. I have been worried to death trying to make a living and am not able to work, and am broken down on my back. I can't lift much and can hardly get up in the morning, so it is better to be dead."

Also in the pocket of the coat was found a Chicago Hotel employment agency receipt to Theodore Dorsch, dated September 14. An autopsy will be held by Coroner Crosby this afternoon and an inquest Wednesday morning.

Asks Court to See She Gets Part of Her Father's Estate

To secure for Alice Wise, 7 years old, a share in the \$50,000 estate of her late father, is the object of an appeal taken to district court from probate court.

The late Mr. Wise's will provided for bequests to his widow and daughter and bequests amounting to \$2000 to other persons. Mrs. Wise exercised her right to take one-half the estate according to law, with the result that the specific bequests exhausted the daughter's portion, which was to be "the remainder of the estate."

The district court is asked to hold that the father did not intend to disinherit his daughter, and to reduce the amounts of the specific bequests.
