Three Want Pay for Inspection of New Dundee Lights

Like a certain active ghost of dramatic lore the name of Dundee will not down in the city council chamber. The Omaha Electric Light and Power company, A. A. Rouner and E. A. Bohrbough have claims against the city for electrical inspection in the sums of \$75, \$122.50 and \$174.05, respectively. The finance and accounts department would not allow the claims until their reasonableness had been determined. The council referred the matter to the superintendent of public improvements for investigation. "I am unable to understand why our city electrical department could not have made the inspection of the new lighting system in Dundee. If we want a little job done on the city hall elevators we have to send outside to have the work done," said one of the commissioners. The commissioners are curious to know why three inspections were necessary on the Dundee lighting plant which was turned over at the time of consolidation in a partially completed condition.

NAHANT, Mass., Sept. 29.—The sudden death of Mrs. Henry Cabot Lodge, wife of Senator Lodge, at her home here last night was announced today. Mrs. Lodge was 48 years old. She and Senator Lodge were married immediately after his graduation from Harvard in 1871.

TRAVELING MAN KILLS HIMSELF

Despondent Over Poor Health Frank Greenwalt Puts Bullet Through His Head.

NO ONE HEARD THE SHOT

Frank Greenwalt, a traveling man about 45 years of age, shot and killed himself Wednesday in his room on the third floor of the Davidge block, Eighteenth and Farnam streets. Despondency, resulting from continued illness, is supposed to have prompted the act. The body was not discovered till afternoon, although Greenwalt probably fired the fatal shot about 10:30, while the adjoining rooms were not occupied. Mrs. Lena Boggs of flat 5, who rented Greenwalt a room last February, was away during the morning and persons in the building did not hear the shot fired. When Mrs. Boggs returned at noon she received a phone call for Greenwalt. Going to his room she found the door locked and was unable to open it. She called the janitor of the building, Lars Paulsen, who lives at 1918 South Forty-eighth street. Peering over the transom the janitor saw Greenwalt's body lying on the floor in a pool of blood.

Dead Some Time.

Police Surgeons Shook and Zimmerman and Officers Aughe and Emory responded to a hurry call, but found the man had been dead for some time, so the coroner was called. Greenwalt fired only one shot, which entered his right temple and passed entirely through his head. The .38 caliber revolver was found beside the body with only one cartridge empty. Greenwalt is said to have suffered a stroke some time ago, which had resulted in permanently poor health. Persons living in the Davidge block assert that Greenwalt rarely spoke to anyone, received very little mail and had few acquaintances and no friends in Omaha, so far as they knew. A brother, J. Greenwalt of Fairfield, Ia., has been notified.

Germany to Keep Out French Flowers

(Correspondence of The Associated Press.) BERLIN, Sept. 29.—The war has brought great difficulties to the flower growers of Germany but also opportunities. For years France and Italy have been the chief markets for cut flowers, and even the duties imposed by Germany have not protected the native merchants. At the recent annual meeting of the various gardening associations throughout the empire, it was resolved to ask the government to make special efforts to keep out of Germany during the coming winter any cut flowers that might otherwise find their way in, via Switzerland, from either France or Italy. Belgium, however, also grows flowers in great quantities. The flower growers therefore decided to urge on the government a duty to protect them against competition from this quarter, after agreeing that it was urgently necessary. The members of the associations represented agreed to undertake to decorate the graves of fallen soldiers through volunteer donations of flowers.

PROMINENT OMAHA DOCTOR DIES IN WASHINGTON.

DR. S. K. SPALDING DIES FROM STROKE

Prominent Omaha Physician Succumbs to Attack of Apoplexy at Washington.

WAS ATTENDING G. A. R. MEET

Dr. S. K. Spalding, for many years one of Omaha's most prominent practicing physicians, died yesterday morning at 8:10 at Washington, D. C., where he was attending the national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic. The death followed an attack of apoplexy Tuesday morning. Dr. Spalding was born in Frankfort, Pa., on August 4, 1847. A few years later he came west to Iowa with his parents. When but 17 years old he enlisted in the army of the republic in the civil war. He was mustered in on February 8, 1865, at Burlington, Ia., and was assigned to the Second Iowa cavalry. During the short time he served during the war his regiment saw service in Missouri, Tennessee, Mississippi and Alabama. He was mustered out after the war ceased on September 19, 1865. In November, 1882, Dr. Spalding came to Omaha and has made his home here ever since. For twenty-five years he has resided at the corner of Twenty-fifth and Charles streets.

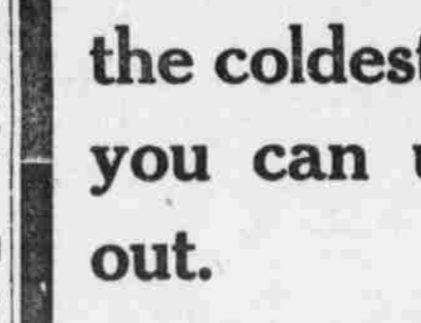
AGED MAN HAS TOUGH LUCK IN WANING YEARS

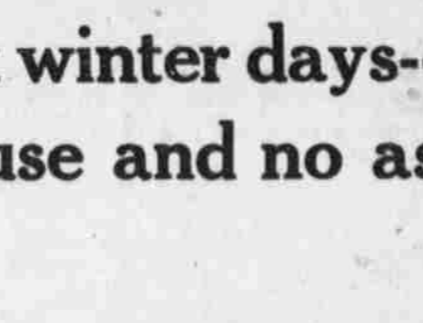

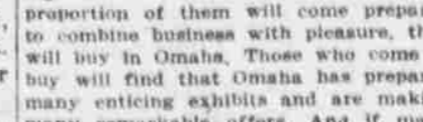

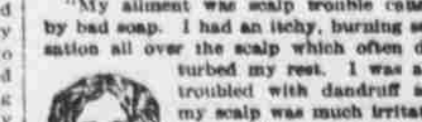
