> When Mrs. Boggs returned at noon she received a phone call for Greenwalt. Going to his room she found the door locked and was unable to rouse him, so called the janitor of the building, Lars Paulsen. who lives at 1016 South Forty-eighth street. Peering over the transom the janitor saw Greenwalt's body lying on the floor in a pool of blood.
