**T**HE social spotlight still centers upon young Howard Spaulding of Chicago and his \$30,000,000 bride, formerly Miss Catherine Barker. The marriage of these young people, which was celebrated at the wonderful Barker estate at Michigan City in July, attracted more comment than any other marriage this last season.

The youthfulness of the two and the fact that the bride's parents are dead and she has no immediate relatives, made its appeal to all.

The Spauldings have just landed in San Francisco after spending their honeymoon in Honolulu, where they were entertained by Hawaiian royalty. The far-famed Queen Lilioukalanui gave a wonderful garden fete for them and Prince Kuyo also entertained at a garden party for the youthful Americans. Governor Pickham gave a luncheon in their honor and other Americans living on the island entertained them extensively.

Mr. and Mrs. Spaulding will motor through southern California and are expected to arrive in Chicago October 15, where they will be the guests of Mr. Spaulding's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Spaulding, until their apartment at 221 East Walton place is put in readiness for them.

We Omaha folks have more than a passing interest in the Spauldings, since they visited in Omaha prior to their marriage. They were attendants at the wedding of Miss Marie Stewart of Council Bluffs and Mr. Donald McFerron in the spring and Mr. and Mrs. McFerron, in turn, were numbered in the Spaulding-Barker wedding party. A number of Omahans also attended the wedding of the "poor, little rich girl" and Mr. Spaulding.

### Sibbersen-Smyth Wedding.

The second of the large and fashionable weddings of the week was that of Miss Rose Clara Smyth and Mr. Clarence Sibbersen, which was celebrated last evening at 8:30 o'clock at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Smyth. The ceremony was performed by Rt. Rev. Richard Scannell, bishop of Omaha, assisted by Father Harrington of St. Cecilia's church.

The bridal party descended the stairway and entered the drawing room through the adjoining room, their way of progress being marked by white pedestals trimmed in asparagus fern and roses. From these white satin ribbons were stretched to a channel erected in the corner, and here the ceremony was performed in a veritable fairland of flowers and lights.

Mr. Martin Bush played the Lohengrin wedding march on an organ installed especially for the ceremony and Miss Mary Munchhoff sang Halda's "Where Thou Goest, There Go I."

The bride was lovely in a quaint gown of white faille, heavily embroidered in silver. The skirt was quite short and was caught up in the back over a petticoat of embroidered chiffon and silver. The bodice was of tulle embroidered in silver and had a cape effect in the back which hung over the top of the train. The gown was cut square neck and had long tulle sleeves. The bride's dark beauty was enhanced by a veil of real princess lace which fell to the end of the train and was worn in pointed effect over the face, caught to the hair with orange blossoms. She carried a shower bouquet of orchids and lilies of the valley.

Miss Mary Lee of Chicago, the maid of honor, was gowned in pale green surah with tunic of tulle embroidered in silver, and caught in places with clusters of pink rosettes. The bodice was of silver lace and sleeves and stockings and slippers of silver added a pretty touch to the costume. Her hair was worn low, banded with silver, and she carried a shower bouquet of bride's roses and sweetheart buds.

The bridesmaids, Miss Catherine Smyth, sister of the bride; Miss Helen Murphy and Miss Beatrice Coak, were gowned alike in glistening frocks of pink with tulle draperies and bodices of silver cloth. The gowns were cut square neck and were hanging length. The bridesmaids also wore silver slippers and stockings and bands of silver in the hair. Each young woman carried a shower bouquet of bride's roses and sweetheart buds.

Mrs. C. J. Smyth, mother of the bride, was gowned in orchid velvet brocaded in silver, the bodice of silver lace with tulle overdrape of the same shade and long tulle sleeves. The neck was cut square and the gown was in train. She wore a corsage bouquet of orchids.

The mother of the groom, Mrs. I. Sibbersen, wore a handsome fawn-colored brocaded satin, a copy of a Worth model. The skirt was draped and the bodice was heavily embroidered in silver.

Mr. Drexel Sibbersen, brother of the groom, was the best man, and the ushers were Messrs. Bernard Smyth, Leon Callahan, Allen Tukey and Edward Murphy.

The bride's gift from the groom was a brooch, consisting of a circle of diamonds set in platinum. A gold monogrammed watch was the bride's gift to Mr. Sibbersen, and to her attendants she gave cloisonne powder boxes, while the ushers received leather pocketbooks, monogrammed in gold, from the groom.

The spacious rooms of the Smyth home were decorated throughout with asparagus fern and orchids, roses, a color scheme of pink and green being carried out. Wall pockets of the roses were used, as well as tall vases, and a shower of roses fell from each chandelier. A round of roses and ferns brightened the dining room table, and autumn leaves and palms beautified the screened porch.
