'Treasurer Hall Reports Receipt of More Than \$10,000 in Last Three Months.

INSANITY TAX FEES COMING IN

(From a Staff Correspondent.) Oct. 1.-(Special.)-State funds deposited in various banks during the last three months will bring the state after Smith's release from the Stoux Falls treasury in more than \$10,000, according penitentiary on parele, to the estimate of State Treasurer Hall. More Bonds Registered. The state auditor has registered \$28,000 of Grand Island paving bonds, purchased by a dealer in Grand Island.

Some time after the war the government made an appropriation to pay Nebraska volunteers for the extra time they put in at Lincoln. Several thausond dollars of uncalled for money still remains of the fund in the hands of the governor.
