Kaiser Has Not Yet Fixed Status of Belgium and Poland

BERLIN, Oct. 1.—(By Wireless to Saxville.)—Germany's attitude toward Holland, Belgium and Poland was outlined in an interview given by Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, under secretary for foreign affairs, to the Nieuwe Rotterdamse Courant. This interview, reproduced in the Lokal Anzeiger, was given out as follows today by the Over-seas News Agency: Dr. Zimmermann intimated Holland had

nothing to fear from Germany. He said Germany would not violate the neutrality of Holland or interfere with its political or economic independence. Germany appreciates the fact that Holland is maintaining a strict neutrality. "As to Belgium, the under secretary stated that its future was still unknown, but solution of this difficult problem must be found which will render it certain that Belgium will not be utilized for the purposes of England. Germany has always desired peace, and now wishes a guarantee that there will not be in the future another war such as the present one. "Poland's future also is unknown, Dr. Zimmermann said. He expressed the con-

vision that no one would be able to oppose Germany's will. WILL GET TEN-HOURS' PAY FOR EIGHT HOURS' WORK CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—Workers in the Standard Oil refineries at Hammond and Whiting, Ind., were informed today that their ten-hour work day has been reduced to eight hours without reduction in pay. Three thousand men are employed and it is said that the reduction in hours will make work for 400 more. At the local offices of the Standard Oil company it was said that the reform was part of a general plan of the company.
