POLICE DISPERSE CHICAGO STRIKERS

Scores Arrested and One Boy Loses Life as Result of Walkout of Clothing Workers.

OFFICERS USE THEIR CLUBS

CHICAGO, Sept. 30 .- Scores of persons were arrested today and one 10-year-old boy lost his life as a result of the strike of the garment was crushed to death in the collapse of a shanty which he had entered to escape from a shooting affray indulged in by some strike sympathiz-

A mob of about 500 persons invaded the wholesale clothing district this afternoon, calling to workers there to join the walkout. Police, who were summoned by a riot call, drove the mob across the river, whence it came. There was considerable hand-to-hand struggling and the police used their sticks freely.

A delegation of union leaders called on Mayor Thompson and protested against what they termed the brutality of the police assigned to the strike zones.

Representatives of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers' union still maintained tonight that the number of garment workers on strike exceeded. 25,000. Manufacturers insisted that not more than 2,000 persons had quit their employment.




