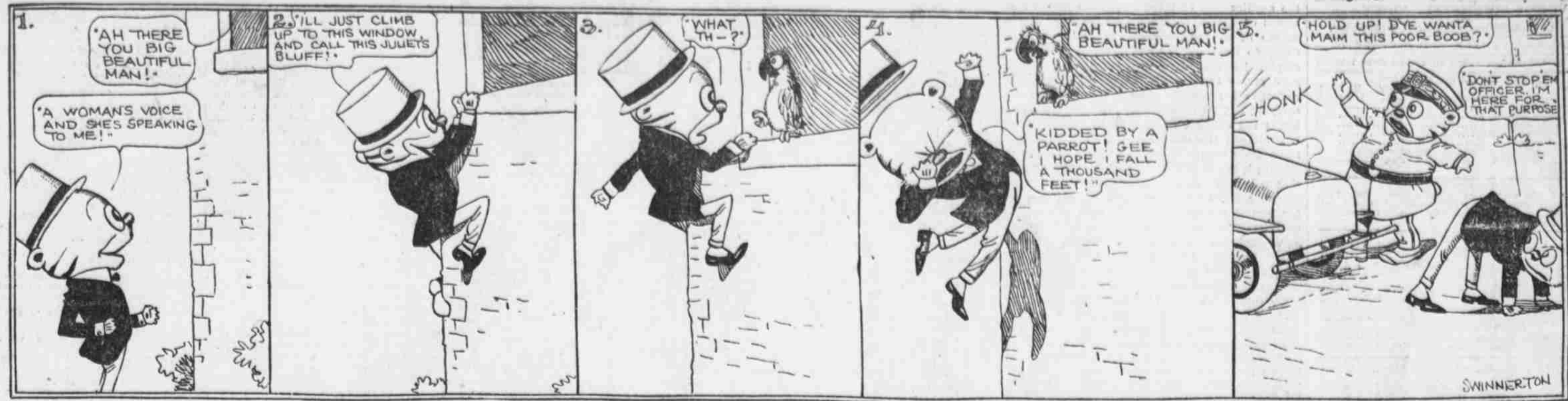


Mr. Jack Loses Some of His Vanity. He Was Really Deceived

OMAHA TRIUMPHS OVER THE BLUFFS

Central High Gridiron Warriors Capture First Foot Ball Game of the Year.

MOREARTY MAKES LONG RUN

Omaha High defeated Council Bluffs High by the score of 14 to 0 Saturday in the first foot ball game of the year.

Touchdowns were made by "Chuck" Morearty and Weirich, the two speedy half backs of the Central High eleven.

At the beginning of the second quarter, with the ball on Omaha's thirty-yard mark, Morearty received a long forward pass from the quarterback and dashed fifty yards through a broken field before he was downed on Council Bluffs' ten-yard line.

During the last three minutes of play Omaha advanced the ball to the four-yard mark and Weirich took the ball over by a dash around right end.

At the start of the game Brewick kicked off to Fullaway, who was downed on the twenty-yard line. Omaha was penalized fifteen yards and Fullaway, with the ball on Omaha's five-yard line, punted out of danger.
