

CHAMPION SHOWS OMAHA SOME GOLF

Robert A. Gardner, Despite Unfamiliarity with Course, Defeats Three Omaha Cracks. GETS OUT OF DIFFICULTIES

Robert A. Gardner of Chicago, national amateur golf champion, demonstrated his superiority over three Omaha cracks yesterday at the Field club in an eighteen-hole foursome. Despite the fact that the national champ was playing the course blind, while the Omahians were familiar with it, and despite the high and cold wind which mad good golf exceedingly difficult, Gardner turned in an eighty-three for the eighteen holes. Sam Reynolds followed Gardner with an eighty-six and Blaine Young turned in a ninety. Karl Bock completed the foursome.

Gardner proved to be a veritable wonder at driving and approaching. His approach shots always brought applause from the large gallery which braved the cold wind to see the champion play. Several times he got into the rough or mixed up with a hazard, but made as pretty an approach shot as even an exceptionally good golfer would make from the fairway.

Gardner is in Omaha as the guest of Karl Bock, Gardner and Bock and Sam Reynolds are all members of the National Coal Dealers' Golf association. The champion will play today at the Country club. His score yesterday was as follows:

Hansel and Gretel were portrayed in the next float standing before the castle of pumpkin candy where the ugly witch was beckoning them to come in, ostensible to get the candy, although in reality she had within a huge oven in which she hoped to roast the children. Puss in Boots. "Puss in Boots" was illustrated by a group of the donkey, the puss and the third son of the dead miller who was peevish because his deceased father had left him only the pussy while he had left the other two sons the mill and the donkey respectively. The puss is looking into the face of the boy preparing to tell him how he can still get the best of the bargain by making proper use of his legacy.

Robinson Crusoe was the next representation. Crusoe and his faithful servant, Friday, were seen in the float. The goats that Crusoe milked were pictured on the island in the background, as well as the parrot that was the lost sailor's only companion until Friday came on the scene. Cinderella. "Cinderella" and her adventures were ably suggested by the float bearing the name. The maiden was just entering the castle to attend the ball she had not expected to be able to attend. The celebrated glass slipper that figured so conspicuously in the fable, was seen in the foreground of the float. The lighting effect set off the magnificence of the old tale nicely. The team of mice that carried Cinderella to the ball late in the evening, were waiting impatiently outside the castle.

"Little Red Riding Hood" lent itself nicely to float portrayal. The hungry wolf was seen in the grandmother's bed where he had just devoured the grandmother, and the innocent little girl with the red hood was seen wandering her way toward the cabin, where the great danger awaited her. Makes 'Em All Shiver. "Bluebeard" was a float that almost sent shivers over the crowd. The hideous tale of the fierce Bluebeard all came back to those who knew it as children, when they looked upon the scene of the good wife opening the closet door of Bluebeard's castle and finding the murdered bodies of her husband's former wives.

"Jack and the Bean Stalk" was a float that pleased the children. Here the stupid giant was seen with beads in the air, apparently just fallen on his silly head, when Jack cut the bean stalk that had supported him. "Rip Van Winkle" brought memories of Washington Irving's masterpiece, when the crowd looked upon the grizzled face of the ancient Rip just awakening from his twenty-year sleep on the summit of the Katskill mountains, where he had been drinking grog with the mysterious bowlers seen in the distance rolling their ten pins.

Lion and the Mouse. "The Lion and the Mouse" was shown by a portrayal of the story of the tiny mouse that gnawed the nets that bound the huge lion. The ferocious lion in all his power was not powerful enough to break the nets which the weak little mouse gnawed to pieces in a few moments. Sly cats were waiting in the background to get the weak little mouse as soon as she gets away from the protection of the king of beasts. The Little Mermaid was worked out to show her, tailless, transfigured in the form of a beautiful princess dancing before the prince who loves her. In the same official quarters it is also pointed out that former Premier Gourmaris made the definite request of France last March that the French land an expedition at Saloniki in order to back up the position of Greece.

The Temps says M. Gourmaris will probably be called to form a ministry. It is generally believed the ministers of France, Great Britain, Italy and Russia have already left Sofia as a result of Bulgaria's unyielding attitude in the face of the ultimatum calling for a definite announcement of her intentions.

Luxus Will Go to Cleveland Sunday. The Luxus will play the White Autos, champions of Cleveland, next Sunday at Cleveland. Yesterday the Cleveland champs defeated the Columbus honor nine after a hard game, 1 to 0. 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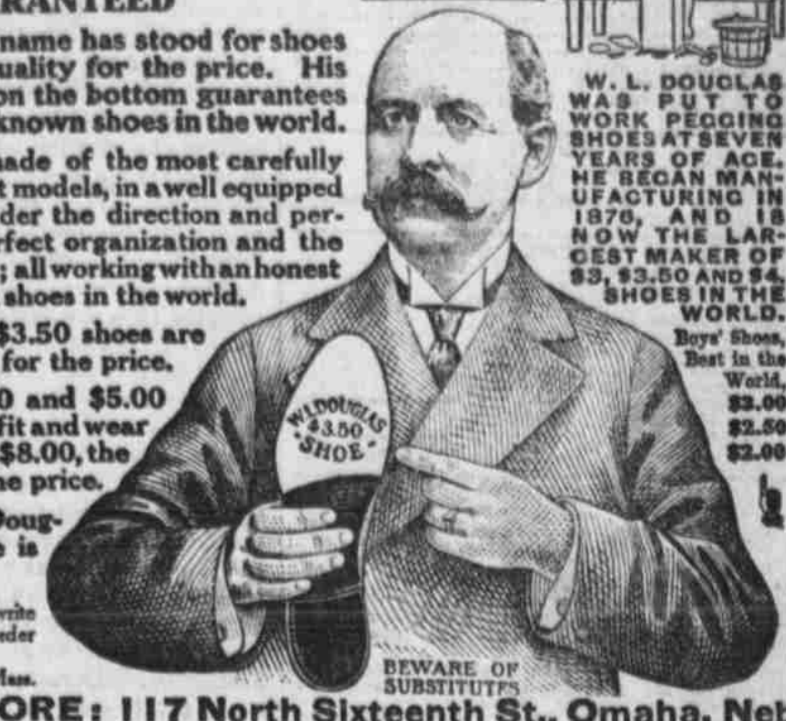
