

BULGARIA LINES UP WITH TEUTONS

Formal Manifesto to People Says it Would Be Suicide to Side with the Allies.

WARM PRAISE FOR GERMANY

BERLIN, Oct. 8.—(By Wireless to Sayville.)—The Frankfurter Zeitung asserts that the Bulgarian government has issued a manifesto to the nation announcing its decision to enter the war on the side of the central powers.

"The manifesto as given out by the news agency follows: "The central powers have promised us parts of Serbia, creating an Austro-Bulgarian border line, which is absolutely necessary for Bulgaria's independence of the Serbians.

"We do not believe in the promises of the quadruple entente. Italy, one of the allies, treacherously broke its treaty of thirty-three years. We believe in Germany, which is fighting the whole world to fulfill its treaty with Austria.

"Bulgaria must fight at the victor's side. The Germans and Austro-Hungarians are victorious on all fronts. Russia soon will have collapsed entirely. Then will come the turn of France, Italy and Serbia. Bulgaria would commit suicide if it did not fight on the side of the central powers, which offers the possibility of realizing its desire for union of all Bulgarian peoples."

Purpose of Allies. "The news agency says further: "The manifesto to the people, which is not only a historical document, but contains valuable material in regard to Bulgarian politics and economics, states that Russia is fighting for Constantinople and the Bosphorus. Great Britain to destroy Germany's empire. France for Alsace and Lorraine and the other allies to rob foreign countries. The central powers are fighting to defend property and assure peaceful progress.

"The loyal neutrality maintained by Bulgaria has been advantageous up to the present time, the manifesto says, and it is only now that military and economic preparations have been completed. "The manifesto says that Serbia, the worst enemy of Bulgaria, has oppressed the purely Bulgarian population of Macedonia in the most barbarous manner, the male population being compelled to die for Serbia's cause, the women being outraged and the rivers running red with blood."

NEW TEUTONIC RAID ON SERBIA IN FULL SWING

(Continued from Page One.) Germany has definitely undertaken a fresh campaign in the Balkans in the support of the activity on the southern end of the eastern front will gradually slacken and that the Teutons will concentrate their energies on Riga and Dvinsk.

French Report Artillery Fight. PARIS, Oct. 8.—North of Arras last night the cannonading continued with both sides taking part, according to announcement made by the French war office this afternoon. There was also artillery activity in the region of Roys and to the north of the River Aisne.

In the Champagne district there was violent bombardment on the part of the German artillery, with very energetic replies from the French cannon. There was also active fighting in the trenches southeast of Tabora.

The cannonading continued last night, both sides taking part, to the north of Arras; in the direction of Bouches and its environs, as well as in the sector of La Felle and near Hill No. 160.

There also was considerable activity on the part of the artillery of the enemy, together with answering fire from our guns in the region of Roys and to the north of the River Aisne, in the direction of Tracy Le Val and at the forest of St. Maré.

In the Champagne district the Germans violently bombarded our positions between the roads running from St. Hilaire to St. Souplet and from Soulaix to Somme-Py. Our batteries everywhere replied to this fire with great energy.

Active fighting took place in the connecting trenches to the southeast of Tabora in the direction of the Butte de Meant.

Heavy Fighting Near Dvinsk. PETROGRAD, Oct. 8.—(Via London.)—There is renewed military activity on the northern and of the Russian front from Dvinsk to Novo Grodek. The heaviest fighting is in the neighborhood of Dvinsk, to the south of which the Germans have had some success. On the whole, however, the Russians have been able to withstand their assaults.

The Germans have succeeded in crossing the Vilsya north of Smorgon, enabling them to co-ordinate their forces north and south of this point. Concentration of considerable German forces in the vicinity of Tarnopol in Galicia, about twenty-five miles south of the frontier, is believed here to be due to political conditions in the Balkans, rather than to an intention of menacing Kiev. Comparative quiet prevails throughout the southern fighting area. Refugees continue to pour into Petrograd at the rate of several thousand daily. A feeding station established by British charities in the Petrograd station of the railway from Warsaw cares for hundreds daily. Lady Georgiana Buchanan, wife of the British ambassador, is in charge of this work.
