SPIRIT OF MUSIC AT FIRST CONCERT

Boston Symphony Orchestra Draws Delighted Audience to Auditorium to Begin Charity Course.

PROGRAM ONE OF WONDERS

It was through the medium of the most noted band of players upon instruments in the world. The Boston Symphony orchestra. The wand which brought the manifestation was in the hand of Dr. Karl Muck.

The occasion was the opening of the course of concerts undertaken by the Associated Retailers of Omaha and known as the Charity Concert Course, because of the fact that the profits will go to Sweet Charity.

If there has been just one thing which has acted in a way as a "brake" on Omaha's progress it has been the ancient old grudge bearing the name of "Precedent."

"Precedent" has kept more good from being accomplished than almost any other cause. "We must not establish a precedent," had been the funeral anthem of many a splendid project and many a good man and many a good woman.

Last night the Associated Retailers took the old fossil "Precedent" out of his cave, broke his backbones beyond possibility of repair and gently but completely kicked the corpse out of doors.

The business men of Omaha who have made King Ak-Sar-Ben the most popular of reigning monarchs (as well as the safest and sanest), those men who have made the "week of weeks" in Omaha an annual joyfest and jubilee, have kicked the "brake" off, and precedent, hereabouts, will be a thing of the past.

The audience which assembled at the Auditorium last night certainly proved to the Associated Retailers that their action in presenting this wonderful chain of concerts was tremendously endorsed. They have surely no reason to regret their action and every reason to be proud.

Any future musical work undertaken by them or given under their direction will be sure to win. And as all great cities are noted for those things which are "unseen and eternal," as well as for the things which are "seen and temporal," Omaha has taken another splendid step forward.

Dr. Muck Expresses Pleasure. The audience was as fine an aggregation of people as one might find anywhere and gave the most intense, one might almost say devotional, interest to every musical offering.

Wonders of the Orchestra. With such a wonderful organization of players, one hundred and one, to be exact, it is possible to do things which are not within the scope of the smaller orchestral bodies which have visited here from time to time, and the orchestra, those who knew them, they never heard the great of their lives.

Majesty of Conductor. And over all, and above all, or rather behind all, was the person of Dr. Karl Muck, one of the greatest of conductors of all time.

As the "Flying Dutchman" overture was being played one could not but think of the fact that Dr. Muck has for years been conducting at Bayreuth, the shrine of the Richard Wagner musical philosophy and of the Music of the Future.

It seemed as though one could feel the actual atmosphere of the great temple and of its illustrious founder, the great Wagner, as the overture unfolded itself.

The Symphony, in A major, known everywhere as "No. 7," was a great delight. It was no "program" that is, it is not descriptive, and some have therefore called it the "Romantic" symphony, in contrast to the "Eroica" and the "Pastorale".

When the great Tchaikovsky proclaims of a work that it is a colossal masterpiece of instrumentation, "people should listen; and they did last night, as they heard the "Capriccio on Spanish Themes" by Rimsky-Korsakoff, the work alluded to. Hear the virtuosity of the various artists was so evident. English horn, Flute, Oboe, Violin (solo), Clarinet, Horn, even Triangle and Side-drum were glorified.

The Splendid program notes were from the pen of the distinguished veteran critic, Philip Hale of Boston. They are preserved. Mr. Anton Wittek displayed the fact that he was the most temperamental "concert-master" who has ever honored this town with a visit.

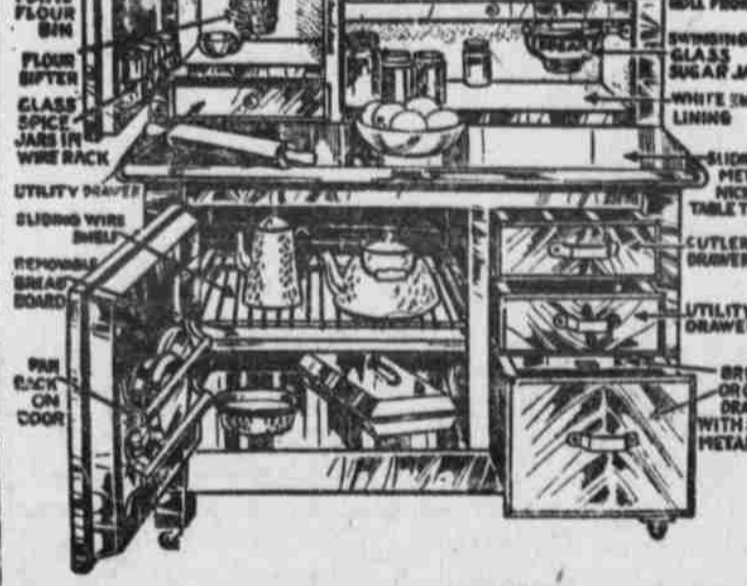
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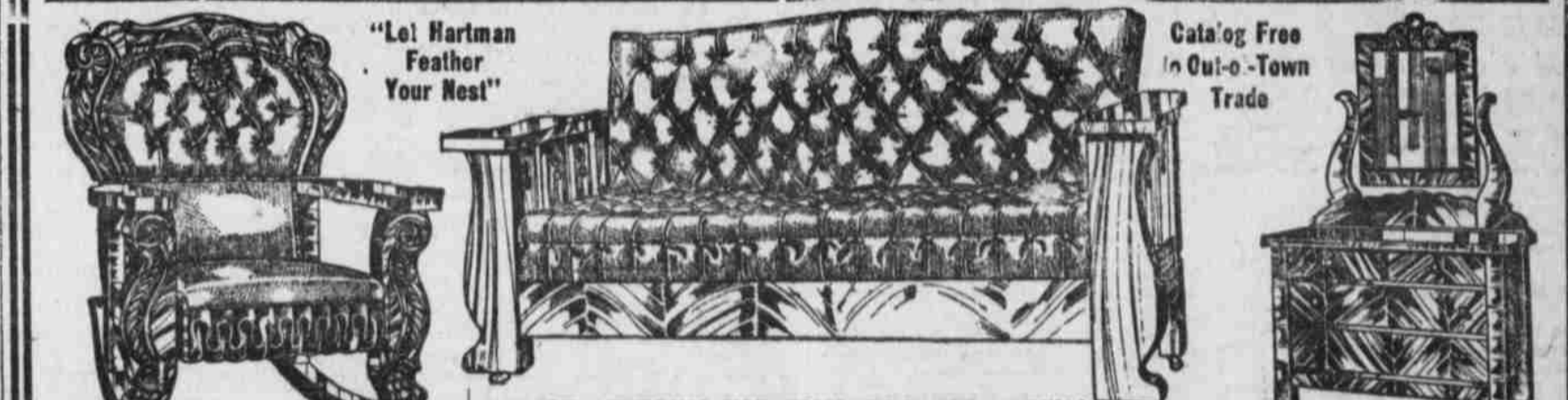
