WITNESS DECLARES TESTIMONY FALSE
Supreme Court Permits Joseph M. Kimmel Freedom on Bond Pending Appeal.

C. C. TAYLOR MAKES AFFIDAVIT
(LINCOLN, Oct. 11.—Special.)—The supreme court today allowed Joseph M. Kimmel's release from the penitentiary conditional upon his filing bond for \$1,000, while his appeal is pending in the high court.

It happened that Taylor himself had been indicted by a grand jury on the charge of conducting a gambling house. Subsequent to Kimmel's conviction Taylor made a sworn statement admitting that his testimony against the former was false and that he gave it on an immunity promise by the county attorney, H. S. Rhoades.

ASK TO HAVE FATHERS' DAY
Women of Hastings Urge Governor Morehead to Set One Apart for Them. EXECUTIVE HAS NOT YET ACTED

LINCOLN, Oct. 11.—(Special.)—Mrs. James Fawthrop and twenty-one other married women of Hastings, Neb., have petitioned Governor Morehead to issue official proclamation naming the fourth Sunday in October, Fathers' day.

While there is a regular observance of Mothers' day, the petition declares, it is only fair that the fathers receive their share of honor and tribute, and in that connection the governor is asked to urge everyone to wear a white carnation, "as a token of love and reverence." Governor Morehead has not yet acted on the petition.

NEBRASKA RURAL SCHOOLS TO BE SHOWN IN THE MOVIES

LINCOLN, Oct. 11.—(Special.)—Nebraska rural schools will be shown in the movies on a trip which State Superintendent Thomas and Inspector Moritz will make the last of the week by automobile.

The "movie" men will secure pictures of the assembly rooms and classes, typical street scenes and rural scenes. The material will be used in lectures to be delivered in the eastern and southern states.

FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLAR DAMAGE SUIT IS FILED
NORTH PLATTE, Neb., Oct. 11.—(Special Telegram.)—A \$50,000 damage suit was filed here today against the Union Pacific and Oregon Short Lines by Mrs. Helen Kirsch, administratrix for the estate of her deceased husband, Nelson E. Kirsch.

Mrs. Kirsch alleges that her husband came to his death while at work for the defendant railroads as brakeman. His body was found near Peru, Wyo., May 6, 1914. Mrs. Kirsch alleges that he was struck by a passing passenger train and that his death was due to negligence of railroad employes. The plaintiff alleges that she and her 7-year-old son, Harold, were dependent upon Nelson E. Kirsch for support and that he was a healthy, robust man capable of earning \$1,000 to \$1,500 a year.
