

MUNITIONS OF WAR GOING TO RUSSIA

Twenty Trainloads Daily Being Sent During Last Three Months from Japan.

OBSERVATIONS BY AN AMERICAN

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—Russia has been receiving munitions of war from Japan at an average rate of twenty train loads a day for more than three months, according to Cyrus Robinson, a mining engineer of London, who arrived here today on the steamship California from Liverpool.

Mr. Robinson said he was in Petrograd two months on government business, the nature of which he declined to discuss. He asserted that rail communication via Vladivostok had been turned over almost entirely to military trains and that the war material coming from Japan helped in a great measure to check the recent advance of the central powers. A number of the California's passengers were from Glasgow. Several of these persons said they had recently returned to that port six dummy battleships that had been with the British fleet. These dummy battleships, made by taking freight steamers and building over them false woodwork and canvas so that they resembled war vessels, were used as decoys in the effort to bring out German torpedo boats and also to locate land batteries along the German coast. They are now being dismantled because the Germans discovered the ruse.

Two tramps had drifted into town and were given liquor and were making trouble for the officer, when he ordered them out. They refused to go and the marshal proceeded to escort them to the city limits, when one of them struck him over the head with a beer bottle.

Dies of Heart Failure. CLARK COUNTY, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—John Jones, a farmer and land owner living north of Clarke, died very suddenly at his home Tuesday noon of heart failure. The authorities have not been able to locate any relatives, though it is known he has some living in Nebraska and Missouri. The funeral will be held at the Pierce chapel, north of Clarke, on Thursday.

TWO BATTLES IN MEXICO EXPECTED

Forces of Villa Prepare to Attack Agua Prieta, Only Remaining Garrison of Carranza.

GUAYMAS TO BE BESEIGED

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 13.—An attack upon Agua Prieta, the only remaining Carranza garrison in Sonora, is in preparation, according to advices received last night by Villa officials in Juarez. The agreement effected some months ago at Naco, through General Hugh L. Scott, American chief of staff, providing for the neutrality of border points, will be ignored, it was stated.

The forces of General Pablo Callas would be attacked by an overwhelming Villa force and flight across the American border was predicted, it was said. General Villa is reported still at Casas Grandes.

An attack upon Guaymas, in southern Sonora, the only west coast port controlled by Villa, was reported imminent in a message received by Callas, from General M. M. Diguessa, Carranza commander at the head of 7,000 attacking troops. Diguessa's message said he had at his disposition the gunboats Guerrero and Pacific and five armed transports.

Early Page County Settler Is Dead

SHENANDOAH, Ia., Oct. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—J. F. M. Porter, one of the oldest settlers of Page county, at whose home the first election was held in 1850, when twenty votes were cast, is dead. He came to this country in 1835. Mr. Porter is survived by four children. The funeral will be held at the Methodist church at Essex tomorrow.

TURKS DESTROY ARCHIVES OF FRENCH CONSULATE

PARIS, Oct. 13.—The American embassy informed the French foreign office today that despite the protests and opposition of the American consul at Beirut, Syria, the French consulate in that city, to which American seals had been applied, and been violated by the Turkish authorities, who began the destruction of the consulate archives.

DEATH RECORD

P. H. Mahoney. PLATTSBURGH, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Last evening at Valley Junction, Ia., P. H. Mahoney of Havelock died at the home of his son, where he with his daughter had gone for a visit, having made the trip in an automobile. Mr. Mahoney was born in Canada in 1832 and in 1870 came to Plattsburgh, after having lived in Iowa for ten years. Here he was united in marriage with Miss Mary Thayer, who died at their home in Havelock about two years ago. Mr. Mahoney was for over thirty years a resident of Plattsburgh and was a member of the city council for a number of terms, as well as the Board of Education.

James E. Lindsey. DAVENPORT, Ia., Oct. 13.—James E. Lindsey, one of the pioneer lumbermen of the Mississippi Valley, died at his home early today aged 82.

Schmidt on Trial on Murder Charge

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 13.—A new venire of talesmen were to report to Judge Frank R. Willis when the trial of Matthew A. Schmidt, charged with murder in connection with the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building, October 1, 1915, was resumed here today. The prosecution also was expected to make formal request that thirteen jurors be impaneled to hear the case.

Both the prosecution and the defense have agreed to the selection of an extra juror, who will serve as a substitute in case of illness or death. Thus far four permanent jurors have been obtained, with five other talesmen passed for cause.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—Federal Judge Hough today handed down a decision declaring unconstitutional the law known as the cotton futures act. He rendered judgment in favor of Daniel T. Hubbard and others in a suit to recover damages for assessments made and collected by the collector of internal revenue.

GERMANS ATTACK FRENCH TRENCHES

Paris Admits Enemy Penetrated Some of Positions on Souchez and Vimy.

ARE REPULSED ELSEWHERE

PARIS, Oct. 13.—A strong German force attacked the French lines around Souchez and Vimy today. A violent bombardment preceded the infantry attacks, which were renewed from time to time and desperately carried out. The Germans succeeded in penetrating some of the trenches, which had been badly shattered by the shells, but according to the French official statement issued tonight were repulsed everywhere else with heavy losses.
