

### Nebraska DIRECT SERVICE FARM TO CAMPUS

University Officials Plan to Afford Direct Means for Students to Travel.

### REWARD FOR A MURDERER

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Two members of the university board of regents, Dr. P. L. Hall and J. E. Miller, with traction company officials, called at the State Railway commission today for direct service between the university farm and the city campus. The board set the hearing for next Monday. It is proposed to use the tracks of the traction company and the interurban for direct service to the farm. Cars will run every ten minutes. The service is to facilitate students reaching the farm and city campuses who have work at both institutions.

### Reward for Murderer

Governor Morehead today announced a reward of \$200 for the apprehension and conviction of the murderer of Frank Bohuslov, the Denton farmer who was shot last week.

### Yates Visits

Farmer Commandant E. Yates, captain of the Thirtieth United States Infantry, which was stationed at Plattsmouth, Neb., where the training camps for civilians were held during the summer and early fall, is visiting in Lincoln with his parents. Mrs. Yates accompanied him here.

"One thing the civilians found out as a result of the camps at Plattsmouth is that a trained soldier cannot be made of raw material in a month's time," said Captain Yates. "The regular army officers who had charge of the camps were well satisfied with the progress made, however, and believe that much good will result."

### Cornerstone Laid At Kearney for the Normal Building

KEARNEY, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—The cornerstone of the new addition building at Plattsmouth Normal school campus here was laid this afternoon.

Over 1,000 people witnessed the ceremonies, which were in charge of the Masonic order, Grand Master Whiting being present. Music was furnished by the State Normal school orchestra and band and a selected chorus rendered several selections.

The state normal board, the city council and the city school board attended in a body and Governor Morehead delivered the address.

Governor Morehead spoke of the prosperity which reigns in Nebraska, and how it made possible the building of such great institutions as the normal schools and commended highly the normal board upon its part in the building up of the great school system. He said that he would rather see the country turning out more young men to go to the head of the schools and to form the rank and file of the great commonwealth than to see the country build up a great army of men to spill the blood of their brothers upon land and sea, as has been done in the great European war the last year.

### Culver Wins the Prize in a Drill

BEATRICE, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—At the competitive drill held by Company C Tuesday evening Sergeant Arlie Culver won first prize for being the best drilled member of the company. Earl Bede was given second prize. The first prize was a fur cap donated by Miller & Shackleton, and the second a razor given by H. Harper. The company was thoroughly drilled by Captain Sears, Major A. H. Hollingworth, ex-Captain W. J. Hemphill and Lieutenants Abbott and Oones, after which the prizes were awarded. A foot ball team has been organized by the company, which will schedule some games with other teams.

A feature of the show is a talk daily by some god authority on live stock. C. B. Lee lectured on "Hogs and Sheep" this afternoon. A unique feature of the Jefferson county fair is an exhibit of Nebraska College of Agriculture, which but few counties in Nebraska were able to obtain, excepting the state fair.

### Nebraska Jordon on Trial for the Murder of Joe Layton

GERING, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—The trial of William Jordon, alias "Dan" Jordon, accused of the murder of Joseph E. Layton, has been taken up before Judge Hobart in district court. The state will urge the theory of a conspiracy in which Layton's wife, who is a daughter of the defendant and the defendant's wife are alleged to figure.

Layton married his wife a year or more previous to the murder, as a result of mail correspondence her home being in California. Later, her father and step-mother joined Layton and his wife on the farm east of Scott's Bluff.

Following supper on the night of the murder the two women, Jordon and Layton and a hired girl, according to evidence at the coroner's inquest, were seated in the kitchen, when a shot was fired through the window from outside. It killed Layton instantly. The first impression was that Layton might have been assassinated by a Russian as a result of a previous killing of which Layton was acquitted, but on grounds of self-defense. The suspicion soon diverted, however, to Jordon, and the apparent theory of the state is that all parties in the room at the time of the shooting, except the hired girl, were in a conspiracy. It is hinted that the testimony of the hired girl will not be so positive on the point of Jordon's presence.

Following the shooting the gun from which the bullet had been fired was found secreted in a haymow, and a box of cartridges found in an outhouse. It is understood that this gun will be identified as belonging to the defendant, and having been brought by him from California.
