It killed Layton instantly. The first im pression was that Layton might have been assassinated by a Russian as a re sult of a previous killing of which Layton was noguitted, but on grounds of self-defense. The suspicion soon diverted however, to Jordon, and the apparent theory of the state is that all parties in the room at the time of the shooting except the hired girl, were in a consp! racy. It is hinted that the testimony of the hired girl will not be so positive on

the point of Jordon's presence. Fellowing the shooting the gun from which the bullet had been fired was found secreted in a haymow, and a box of cartridges found in an outhouse. It is understood that this gun will be identified as belonging to the defendant, and having been brought by him from Call-
