Young Lad Almost Loses Ear by Falling Beneath Wagon on Street.

DOCTORS MANAGE TO AID HIM

Escaping instant death by a broken neck but a few inches, Raymond Merrill, 6 years of age, living at Forty-ninth and H streets, crawled from beneath a big farm wagon, his left ear cut almost entirely off at Forty-second and L streets yesterday afternoon. The wagon was going west on L street and was being towed, empty, by R. W. Rapp, a drayman of the South Side.

Merrill, accompanied by three other playmates, George Peters, George and Thomas Jensen, all living in that vicinity, had climbed on the open tongue by which the wagon was being towed toward. In some manner Merrill fell from his uncertain perch under the wheels.

Officer Herdzina, on whose beat the accident occurred, witnessed the fall and hurried to the rescue of the hurt youngster. Drs. Koenig and Frick were raced to the scene in Captain Striggs' car and the boy was taken to the hospital. The ear was sewed back in place.

Knives in Boys' Scrap.

Two knives in the hands of James Fellows, 14-year-old negro student of the West Side school, and another unidentified boy, figured largely in a schoolboy scrap after school hours yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Charles Uvick, one of the fighting youngsters, was cut in several places about the face by the colored lad.

Fellows was brought to the police station by Sergeant Sheehan and Special Officer Zainodok yesterday afternoon. He told the captain that he had been set on by a whole gang of kids and in defense used a small jackknife, slashing Uvick with intent to wound. The little colored lad received several severe cuts on the right hand during the scuffle.

Fire Flies to Light Homes of Future

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 15.—Illumination for the homes of the future from the luciferous substance carried by fire flies, certain other insects, fish and animals, was predicted by Dr. Urie Dahlgren, professor of biology at Princeton university, in a lecture here tonight at Franklin institute. His subject was "The Production of Electricity by Animals."

Condition of Francis Joseph Daily Worse

ROME (Via Paris), Oct. 15.—The Idea Nazionale says it learns from trustworthy sources that the condition of Emperor Francis Joseph is growing worse. The mind of the Austrian emperor, the newspapers say, is weakening and he is suffering from depression and has frequent spells of weeping.

Baron Burian, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, when asked by a reporter of the Vienna Neue Freie Presse concerning the health of the emperor, sadly shook his head, the Idea Nazionale asserts.

Japs Selling Shells To Russia at Cost

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Osaka, a member of the Japanese Parliament, who arrived here today on the American liner St. Louis from Liverpool, said that Japanese ammunition plants and arsenals are running at full capacity and that a considerable portion of the products are sent to Russia. He said that Japan sells the war munitions at cost to the Russian government.

Asks U. S. to Act in Armenians' Behalf

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Resolutions calling on the government of the United States to use its influence in stopping atrocities against Armenians in Turkey were adopted today by delegates attending the meeting marking the opening of the laymen's missionary movement campaign for increased interest in missionary affairs. The convention committee of the movement was instructed to frame such an appeal, which will be sent to President Wilson.

Cruiser Sunk in Fight In Gulf of Finland

STOCKHOLM (Via London), Oct. 15.—The Attonbladet's frontier correspondent says a naval fight has occurred near Porkkala in the gulf of Finland. One cruiser is reported to have been sunk and another heavily damaged. "The correspondent adds that a Zepplin has raided the Finnish coast, causing fires.

TWELVE TENTATIVE JURORS IN BOX TO BE CHALLENGED

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Twelve tentative jurors selected yesterday in the trial of William Rockefeller, Lewis Cass Leary, Edward D. Robbins and eight other directors, past and present, of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad, charged with conspiracy under the Sherman law, took their seats in the jury box when court opened today to await the possible peremptory challenges.

OPPOSITION TO EMPEROR TUNG

Press of China Generally Takes a Stand Against Returning to Former Methods.

WATCHFUL FOR THE FUTURE

(Correspondence of The Associated Press.) TOKYO, Oct. 15.—The possibility of a "coup d'etat" in China, whereby Yuan Shi-Kai would proclaim himself emperor, is eagerly discussed throughout Japan. The official view as expressed is that as long as any political change is not accompanied by disorder which endangers the material interests of the Japanese in China, the government of the emperor remains a republic or a constitutional monarchy. President Yuan Shi-Kai is not greatly concerned about whether China remains a republic or a constitutional monarchy, but he is anxious to see the emperor restored to the throne. He is disturbed by the policy of the Japanese government in any case will have to be formulated at that time.

The press is for the most part opposed to a return to a monarchy, believing existing disorders would prejudice the interests of Japan. On the whole, however, the feeling is that Japan will have no cause to complain if President Yuan becomes emperor, just as Japan had no cause to complain when China became a republic, although protests were sent to China owing to damage done to Japanese interests by the revolution.

Mr. Hiroki, the Japanese minister to Peking who has arrived here on leave, is quoted as predicting that the imperial regime will be resurrected. As to the choice for emperor, he finds that some prefer Emperor Hsuan Tung, or the descendant of Confucius, while others favor a son of the Ming dynasty. However, the minister thinks that public opinion is generally hostile to the restoration of the Emperor Hsuan Tung because it is believed that this would restore

CARRANZISTAS OCCUPY EMPALME AND GUAYMAS

GUAYMAS, Mexico, Oct. 15.—(By Radio to San Diego.)—Carranza forces occupied Guaymas and Empalme yesterday, following the evacuation of the two towns by the Villa troops Tuesday. Carranza's troops now control every port on the west coast of Mexico except Ensenada, a town in lower California, held by Villa.
