Nebraska Board of Control Inquires Into Events At Norfolk Asylum

NORFOLK, Neb., Oct. 26.—(Special Telegram.)—It became known today that members of the State Board of Control prolonged their regular inspection visit at the Norfolk State hospital for the insane last week several hours to inquire into a number of matters connected with the institution.

The board made an investigation of the recent suicide at the state hospital, and Judge Howard Kennedy afterward said that they found no blame attaching to anyone.

Some of the matters inquired into Mr. Kennedy said he was not at liberty to discuss now, but he admitted that a complaint made by Miss Hattie Uttsch of Norfolk, a nurse, who has since become Mrs. H. S. Morse, was taken up by the board.

Miss Uttsch's complaint relates to an incident that she said occurred at the weekly dance Thursday night, which the board members attended. She said that during an old-fashioned dance, in which the participants promiscuously joined hands, Superintendent Guttery grabbed her hand and gave her a severe twist, which caused her to cry.

When asked about the incident, Dr. Guttery said: "Nothing of the kind occurred. We were dancing the 'Lucker,' and doing the promenade. A number of women and patients were in the group and I was among them to see that all were having a good time. I am not conscious how I took the girl's hand in the dance, or whether I passed her or not."

Nebraska BURLINGTON TO CUT OFF TRAINS AT END OF WEEK

With expectation travel practically at an end, the Burlington train service will go back to the annual winter schedule, October 31, this being in line with the plans of all the other roads.

On the date named, the running of trains Nos. 1 and 20, the Chicago-Denver trains through Omaha will be discontinued, Nos. 41 and 42, operating between Omaha and Lincoln will be discontinued. These trains were operated during the summer rush and run as sections of Nos. 1 and 2.

The Chicago-Omaha-California tourist car service that has been in operation daily during the summer will be reduced to three days per week and the through car service in connection with the Union Pacific by way of Denver will be discontinued.

RAILROADS PREPARING FOR SOME BETTERMENTS

While officials of the Omaha railroads are not figuring on any extensions, or any great amount of new work next year, they are all anticipating that large sums of money will be spent in repairs and betterments, and at the same time they are anticipating the replacing of a great deal of track with heavier steel.

Already the Union Pacific has placed orders for 11,500 tons of steel rails for delivery during 1916; the Northwestern, 22,000 tons, much of which will be used on western lines, and the Chicago Great Western 8,000 tons. The Milwaukee has placed orders for 25 tons of steel for bridges.



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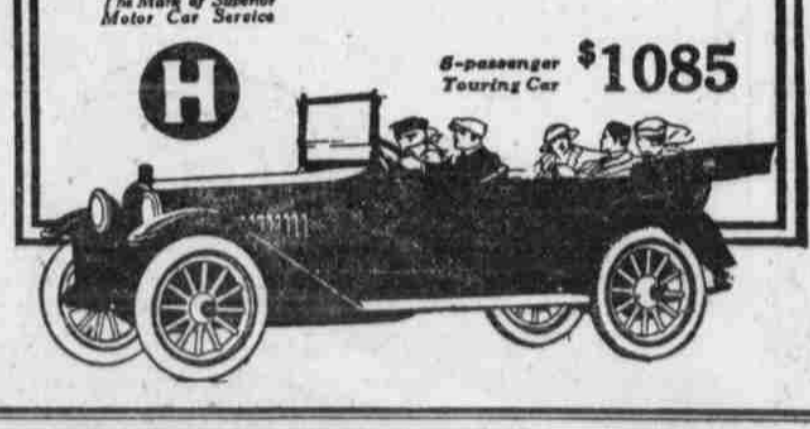
