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SALOON LICENSE REVOKED BY CITY

All Six Members of City Commission Present Vote for the Revocation.

WILL BE A COURT HEARING

Six members of the city council voted to revoke the liquor license of Ford & Graham, 1266 Farnam street, convicted in police court October 23 on charges of illegal sale of liquors on the evening of October 5. Commissioner Withnell was absent.

During the hearing of mooted legal points involving the rights or option of the council in the premises, Attorney Ritchie, for the convicted saloon men, drew the fire of Commissioner Hummel by endeavoring to enlighten the council on the meaning of the word "forthwith." Mr. Hummel contended that it means "instantly," which the attorney insisted it means "a reasonable time." Mr. Hummel won in a walk.

Never Took a Drink

Another feature of the proceedings was the presentation of J. J. Ford by Attorney Ritchie to the council as a living example of a saloon man who has never taken a drink of liquor in his life.

Commissioner Jardine made this statement: "On the evening when the alleged sales were said to have occurred, which was the evening of the Al-Sar-Ban electrical parade, members of my family happened to be in their automobile near the Ford & Graham saloon and they reported to me that a man on the walk was soliciting business for the saloon."

convicting the license will be reinstated. City Attorney Rine, City Solicitor Flaherty and City Prosecutor McGuire advised the commissioners that it is their specific duty to revoke the license of a saloon keeper who has been convicted in a court of competent jurisdiction.

Attorney Ritchie charged the city legal department with trying to act in a legislative capacity, whereupon the city attorney rebuffed by saying he never in his whole life tried to usurp the functions of the legislature.

During the noise of words Commissioner Kugel said: "I have trouble of my own without being bothered with these saloon men trying to unload their troubles upon me. The police court transcript of the case states that Ford and Graham were convicted and the legal department says it is our duty to revoke the license."
