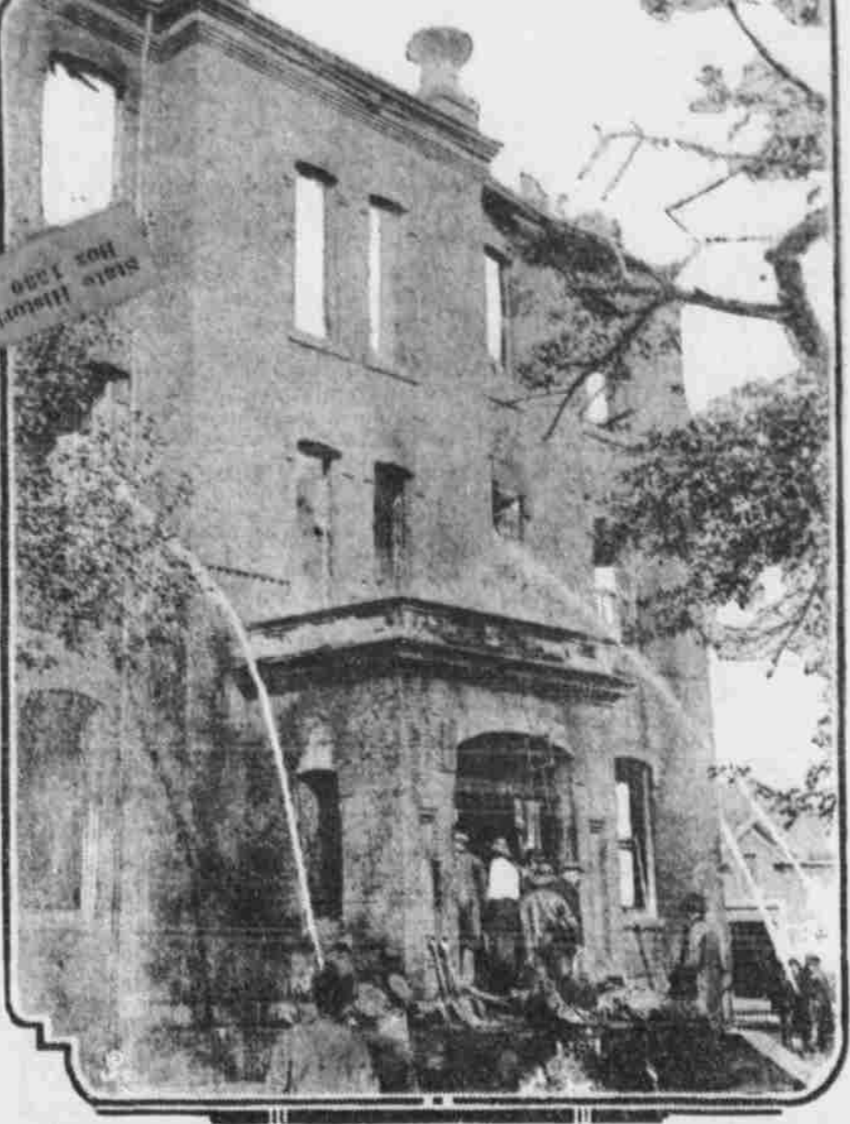

THE DAY'S WAR NEWS. ALMOST COINCIDENT with the report that the Russians are sending transports with troops through the Black sea for the purpose of making a landing on the Bulgarian coast, comes the unofficial statement that a naval engagement between Turkish and Russian warships has taken place in these waters.

THE BULGARIANS are said to be preparing special trains to transport German troops over the Bulgarian railroad to Constantinople through Thrace. Already war munitions have been despatched to the Turkish capital.
