Scandinavian Ships Halted by Germans

LONDON, Oct. 17.—Telegraphing from Copenhagen on October 16, the correspondent of the Daily Mail relates that a Norwegian trawler captain who had arrived there from Stavanger, Norway, declares that during his crossing of the North sea he and his crew observed about twenty cruisers and some transports.

Information has been received here that during the last week German cruisers and torpedo boats stationed south of Falsterbo stopped eighteen Scandinavian steamers and searched them for contraband. None was found. The vessels were bound to Russia, England and France. Valsterbo is a Swedish port not far from Malmö.
