Omaha Alumni to Go to Big Contest on Special Train.

INTEREST HERE INTENSE

Reverend of Old Cornhusker Fight and Close Aggie Score with Michigan Predicts Great Battle on Nebraska Field.

Among Thomas of the Omaha alumni of the University of Nebraska has procured 200 tickets to the Michigan-Aggie game in Lincoln Saturday for disposal in Omaha. Thomas tried to obtain more, but the demand is so great in Lincoln that Guy Reed limited the number of tickets to be sold here to 200. A special train will leave here Saturday on the Burlington at 12:15. It will arrive in Lincoln at 1:45 and the game will start at 2:30. Coming back the train will leave Lincoln at 5:30.

The Michigan Aggie game is creating almost as much interest to local Cornhusker supporters as the Minnesota game did a year ago. The Aggies are a strong aggregation this year and they will be among the leaders in western football. Last Saturday they were defeated by Michigan university, 3 to 6, a field goal alone spelling defeat, and it was only the break in luck that gave the Wolverines the game.

The Aggies had carried the ball to the Wolverine five-yard line and within two downs to go, the Aggie quarter back just signaled for Captain Julian to plunge the line when the whistle blew ending the period and ruining the Minnesota Athletic club's chances.

The Aggies have practically the same team they had last year, when they completed the season undefeated, and victors over Yale's men, Captain Julian, one of the most powerful backfield men in the west, Deparis, an open field runner of repute, and one of the best kickers in the country, and the trio of peerless Millers are included in the lineup.

On the other hand, Nebraska proved Saturday at Manhattan that the old Cornhusker spirit has been revived. After two disappointing games the first two Saturdays of the year, Steinhilber's men came back and with Herb Potter back in harness to lead them on, they went through the Kansas Aggies like a shell from a German mortar. Quarterback was the weak spot in the Husker lineup and now that Potter has returned that weakness has been more than remedied.

With Rutherford and Chamberlain in the backfield the Husker scoring machine is complete and with Vic Halligan to lead assistance by his terrific tackle round plunners, Potter can be depended upon to make the most of every opportunity presenting itself.

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JURY PANEL IS WARNED

Second Scandal in Connection with Bribery in Des Moines.

JUROR HULL UP FOR CONTEMPT

Evidence Secured in Iowa Capital that Man Sought to Get Money from Ligitant for Hanging Jury.

(From a Staff Correspondent) DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—Unearthing of the second jury scandal that has occurred at the court house in the last eight months caused mild sensation among the judges and lawyers and resulted in the citing of Juror B. A. Hull for contempt, the discharge of the jury of which he was a member and a warning to the entire panel.

County Auditor Under Fire.

A peculiar situation has developed in Van Buren county, where County Auditor Duckworth is under fire for his part in causing an enormous increase in taxes in that county. The situation is interesting because of the fact that it was in taxes more than they should have paid. Then when the fact was disclosed this year he denied receiving a letter from state officials telling what to do to rectify it and only after officials came to Des Moines and found out the truth did he consent to rectify the error.

Reynolds May Head Bank.

It is believed by Des Moines bankers that the election of Arthur Reynolds of the Des Moines National bank to be governor of the state in Chicago is a certainty. At the national association of bankers his name was nominated by H. B. Joy of Detroit, one of the directors. His brother, George M. Reynolds, of Chicago is another director and there are three Iowa directors, all of whom would be for him, so he will have five directors favorable to him if he consents to take the place. It is an open secret here and has been for a long time that he desires to get into a larger field and it is therefore regarded as certain he will accept. The Des Moines bankers figure this would give Iowa a good deal of prestige in connection with the Chicago reserve bank.

Will Ask Church Affiliation.

On the new census cards for Iowa use next year there is a new blank, one asking for the church affiliations of all the people. This has never been sought before in the taking of the state census. The cards also have a blank for the education experience of each person, blind, deaf, etc. The cards are being printed now for the use of the assessors and they are much smaller cards than used ten years ago, so that they will fit into steel filing cases and be available for reference at any time.

Insurance Companies Relent.

Information received by the industrial commissioner indicates that the insurance companies writing workmen's compensation risks have materially changed front with a view to avoiding the storm of indignation that seemed coming in Iowa because of arbitrary actions. They have reduced the rates for the business quite materially, but have, in some cases, sent out word to ignore the question of the age or infirmities of employees. This latter, the discriminations forced by the companies, has been a very tender spot with the Iowa laboring man.

Guard Company Was Rebellious.

The adjutant general has ordered the mustering out of the National Guard company at Carroll. At the time of the August encampment of the guard the company failed to report and the men were brought to camp under arrest. The officers of the company have been indifferent and the company is badly organized, so an order has been issued to muster it out at once.

Will Pass on Union Stations.

The state railway commission on November 24 will consider the petition of thousands of residents of Cedar Rapids for an order to compel the Rock Island and Northwestern railroads to construct a new Union station in the western part of the city. On December 1 the commission will consider the application of commercial organizations in Council Bluffs for an order for a union station in that city for all the railroads. The commission is very much in doubt whether it has any authority in either case or can go very far in compelling the construction of union stations under such circumstances. The law only provides that

the commission may compel a union station at crossings or junctions.

Booth to Come to Iowa.

Senator Booth of Idaho has been billed by the republicans for two speeches in Iowa. He will be in Cedar Rapids the 28th and in Sioux City the 29th. A number of dates have been arranged for the republican members of congress. Senators Kenyon and Cummins, Governor Clarke, Lieutenant Governor Harding and others have been busy the last week and have reported good meetings.

Indicted for Kidnaping.

An indictment charging him with robbery, was returned against Ed Wegener, Valley Junction saloonist, by the grand jury in connection with the assault and attempted kidnaping of Charles Ashworth, a wealthy Polk county farmer. Frank Lavelle, who was indicted jointly with Wegener, entered a plea of not guilty to the charge when arraigned in criminal court today. The crime carries with it a maximum penalty of twenty years. In his testimony before the grand jury, Ashworth charged Wegener with being a party to the affair. As yet the authorities have no trace of Wegener, who has been missing from Valley Junction for a week.

Western League to Discuss Sale of the Topeka Franchise

CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—The club owners of the Western league will discuss the proposed sale of the Topeka franchise and other important matters at a meeting to be held at Omaha during the convocation of the National Association of Minor leagues there November 16-12. This was announced by President Norris O'Neill today.

Federal Leaguers May Buy Yankees

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—Local base ball circles were startled today by a report that the Ward brothers, backers of the Brooklyn Federal league club, were negotiating for the purchase of the New York American league club. The report carried a rider to the effect that this move was the first of a series which would eventually restore peace in the ranks of organized and independent base ball.

CANADIAN TROOPS TAKEN TO ENGLAND BY ATLANTIC LINER

AVONMOUTH, Eng., Oct. 19.—(Via London)—A well known Atlantic liner arrived here today bringing a large number of Canadian troops to augment those already camped in England. The first news the townspeople had of their arrival was the sound of the the fire and the drum on the streets. The men entrained immediately for a destination not announced.
