AFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Stock Yards Receipts of Cattle
Establish New Record.
BEST MARK IN THREE YEARS
National Construction Company is
Given Paying Contracts for
Twenty-First and Twenty-
Second Streets.
Receipts yesterday at the stock yards
established a new record in the number
of cars received, over 16,700 head of cattle
keeping the stockmen going at a lively
clip.
This is the largest supply for any one
day since October 3, 1911, when a total
of 16,543 head were received. On last
Monday the run was 12,841 head and on
the corresponding Monday a year ago
the total was 9,411 head. As compared
to 87 cars received in the record-breaking
day in 1911, yesterday's number went
two better, 89 cars being tabulated, in
all.

Board Expending
More Money This Year

During the first nine months of 1914
the Board of Education spent some \$1,000
more than last year. The total expenditure
for the first nine months of this fiscal
year is \$82,677.79 and for the first
nine months of last year \$81,680.32.
The report as made last year shows the
receipts for the first nine months to have
been \$67,282.13, which together with the
balance on hand at the beginning of the
year made \$118,000.00. The expenditure to
October 3 leaves a balance of \$44,548.32.

WOMEN FOR CHRISTMAS SHIP
Woman's Club Co-operates in Col-
lecting Toys.

Also resolve for suffrage
Affirmative Vote Not Assertive, but
Acceptance by Chair Granted with
Vociferous Applause by
Those Present.

The Omaha Woman's club voted unani-
mously Monday afternoon to co-operate
with the Christmas ship. The club also
endorsed suffrage resolutions which were
introduced by Mrs. C. W. Hayes, Mrs. E.
G. Craighead and Mrs. F. J. Brea. When
the viva voce vote was taken the "ayes"
were not strongly assertive, but the an-
nouncement from the chair that the res-
olutions were adopted brought loud cheer-
ing. This completes the action of the
general federation, state federation and
local club endorsement of suffrage.
Delegates Report.
Reports of delegates to the biennial
convention in Chicago and the Nebraska
Federation of Women's Clubs convention
at Pawnee City were the special order of
the day. In reporting the activities of
the civil service reform department Mrs.
W. T. Johnson spoke of the increasing
favor with which the merit system was
being regarded for civil service. "What
we want is fewer elective offices and
more appointive positions—the abolition of
the spoils system in favor of the merit
system."

Advocates Social Hygiene.

Mrs. K. R. J. Edholm, chairman of the
state health committee, reported the work
of this department. "Tie health is drug-
less, foodless and superstitionless, and
will be attained when people awaken," she
said. Mrs. Edholm advocated the teach-
ing of social hygiene and said that the
national children's bureau had been re-
quested by the General Federation of
Women's Clubs to issue a text book for
parents to teach this subject to their
children.
Mrs. N. H. Nelson, president of the club,
and Mrs. John Haarman also gave reports.
The club appropriated \$100 for a fund for
the president of the General Federation
of Women's Clubs, who in the past has
been forced to call upon her private
means in order to carry on the work of
her office.
