AGGIES ARE READY FOR PRAY

Michigan Stars Beach Lincoln and Hold Short Practice.

HARD GAME IS EXPECTED

Fullback Julian Holds All-American Honors and Pretty Duel is Expected Between Him and Rutherford.

LINCOLN, Oct. 23.—(Special).—All Lincoln is foot ball mad again with the Michigan Aggie-Cornhusker game but a day off. The Michigan squad, nineteen strong, accompanied by Coach Macklin, arrived in Lincoln this morning and immediately established headquarters at the Lincoln.

The visitors are a husky-looking bunch and promise to furnish about the strongest opposition Nebraska has encountered in the last three years. Coach Macklin said his squad had come through the hard Michigan game last Saturday in perfect physical condition and every man on the team was fit for a hard, close game.

Work on Nebraska Field.

Through the courtesy of Coach Stehm, the Aggies were allotted the use of the Nebraska field during the earlier part of the afternoon and went through a long brisk signal practice to loosen their joints after the long trip. The practice was not secret, newspaper men being permitted to get a preliminary glimpse of the Aggies in action.

Nebraska also went through a short practice this evening in which all of the regulars participated. Rutherford and Howard are the only two men who are not in the best physical condition, and both of them are expected to start the game. Rutherford still carries a limp as a result of a kick in the groin Wednesday evening during a fierce scrimmage, but the Nebraska star claims to be feeling fit and expects to play the game of his life.

Potter, who has solved the quarterback problem for Stehm, was also slightly indisposed, but will be on the lineup Saturday.

The field promises to be heavy as a result of the continuous rain, but Manager Reed is taking all possible precautions to have it in the best possible condition and foot ball fandom is looking for the greatest game of the year.

Julian Attracts Attention.

Fullback Julian of the Aggies is exciting much attention. He won All-American honors and is expected to be the worst trouble maker for Nebraska tomorrow. Julian is about the same build as Rutherford and the two stars promise to have a battle royal tomorrow. Julian has it on Rutherford in point of experience inasmuch as this is his fourth year of collegiate foot ball while Rutherford has played on the Nebraska team but once.

Both coaches were very conservative in their statements. Stehm thought the result would be close. Macklin said that the Aggies were expecting the hardest game of the season as they had received reports of the strength of the Cornhusker team.

Game at 2:30 O'clock.

The game will start at 2:30 o'clock promptly in order to permit the visitors

to catch an early evening train for Chicago.

A big foot ball rally, at which there was an overflow crowd, was held this morning at the university, and a torch-light parade was held tonight.

Gilmore Re-elected Federal President

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—James A. Gilmore was elected president and treasurer of the Federal league for a term of five years at a meeting held here today. Gilmore succeeds himself as president and John A. George as treasurer. R. B. Ward was elected vice president and Lloyd Rickert secretary, each for a term of one year.

President Gilmore denied that negotiations for the purchase of the Chicago Cubs by Charles Weegman or the New York Americans by the Ward brothers were under way or being considered. It was also stated that no propositions concerning a peace agreement had been advanced by Organized Base Ball.

In a special car attached to Burlington No. 1, the Michigan Aggies, who play the Nebraska university foot ball team, passed through Omaha at 6:30 yesterday morning. None of the men was up.

It is understood that another large section in the grandstand has been reserved for the Omaha contingent going to the game tomorrow and besides these there will be a bunch of side line tickets set aside for parties from Omaha.

FOUR BIG GAMES IN WEST

At Lat Least that Many Involving Championship Honors Slated.

SIoux FALLS ONE BATTLE SCENE

Notre Dame Clashes with Coyotes, While Michigan Aggies Meet Cornhusker Band at Lincoln.

Whatever is new in foot ball probably will be shown in tomorrow's games, for the time is past in which crafty coaches could conceal their fancy tactics. At least four games involving claims to championship honors are on the card in the central states, and in them it is likely the leaders will use their strongest lineups and their deepest strategy.

Possibilities of the Rugby pass when adapted to modern American foot ball, as shown in Yale's defeat of Notre Dame last Saturday, may be further revealed when the latter eleven clashes tomorrow with South Dakota at Sioux Falls.

Eichenlaub Out.

On performance the South Dakotans should furnish Notre Dame with something less of a battle than that they gave last year, but Harper's lineup will be lacking Eichenlaub, out with injuries, and will be further handicapped with a shifted backfield.

The meeting between the Michigan Aggies and Nebraska at Lincoln will be fraught with interest. Last year these teams went through the season undefeated and each laid claim, with strong basis, to the "western championship."

Two games decisive in their nature will be played in the race for Big Nine honors. Chicago's hope for another clear title depends on its beating Purdue, probably the strongest opponent yet to face the Maroons, while in its contest with Iowa, Minnesota should give critics a chance to estimate its championship possibilities.

Illinois expects little trouble with Northwestern and Zappke may use his stars in only a brief part of the game. Neither the Illini nor Wisconsin should be forced to undergo pinch tactics.

Tigers Meet Ames.

Two games destined to show the status of Missouri valley affairs are on the program. Kansas tackles an old rival in the Manhattan Aggies and Missouri meets Ames. The Jayhawkers so far have made the best showing of this quarter and on form should down the Aggies. With defeats by Rolla and Oklahoma in its record, Missouri to win from the aggressive Ames eleven must have improved rapidly.

With Huggitt out, Michigan begins its eastern campaign, playing the strong Syracuse eleven. Coming out of the gruelling Aggies contest and with the Harvard game only a week away, the Wolverines face a difficult problem in the contest with the York State Methodists.

Ames Confident of Victory Over Missouri Today

AMES, Ia., Oct. 23.—(Special).—With a squad of eighteen men, four fewer than were taken to the Minnesota game two weeks ago the Ames coaches left the Cyclone game yesterday afternoon for Columbia, where Missouri university has its homecoming festival with the Ames-Tiger game as the attraction Saturday, to even up for the 21-to-13 Missouri victory over the Cyclones last fall on State field on the occasion of the Ames homecoming celebration.

To compensate for the mediocrity of the Ames eleven, the Ames mentors saw encouragement in Missouri's losing to the Rolla School of Mines and to Oklahoma university. Captain Reeve, confident that his team would add another cyclone score to the list of triumphs over the Tigers which was unbroken in six years except for the bobble last year, said that the morale of the team for the rest of the season hung on tomorrow's battle at Columbia.

Iowa Will Present Lineup of Cripples for Minnesota Game

IOWA CITY, Ia., Oct. 23.—(Special).—The Iowa team finished its preparation for the Minnesota game today. No work was done except a very light signal practice, which was run through at the Iowa City Country club, where the men were taken in the afternoon for an outing. Injuries to several of the players have made the Iowa lineup uncertain. As near as it can be given now it will be thus: Left end, Gunderson, 176; left tackle, Jacobson, 175, or Barron, 201; left guard, Denio, 193, or Wilson, 174; center, Houghton, 176; right guard, Brueckner, 182; right tackle, Kirk, 183; right end, Carberry, 184, or Leighton, 166; quarterback, Gross, 139; left half, Kerwick, 173, or Donnelly, 161; right half, Parsons, 153; fullback, Garrison, 178, or Willis, 183.

Booth Garrison and Willis, the two fullback candidates, are injured, Garrison having a ligament in his side and Willis a broken rib. Carberry has a wrenched back, while Barron, the regular left tackle, broke his wrist two weeks ago and probably will not start tomorrow. Denio and Wilson have been waiting an even fight for the left guard position. Kerwick and Donnelly both have had time.

The Minnesota team arrived in Cedar Rapids today and practiced there on the Coe college field this afternoon. The Gophers will come here by Interurban just in time for the game tomorrow.

Two Aviators to Fly Sunday at the Stadium Speedway

PUTTING OUT BEAR REPORTS

Creighton Dopes Itself to Lose in the Foot Ball Game Today.

WESLEYAN IN FINE FETTLE

Men Trained Down to Good Condition and Each and All Much Heavier Than Those on Local Team.

Creighton and Nebraska Wesleyan meet in their annual foot ball game on Creighton field at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Tommy Mills, coach of Omaha High, will referee; Lester Caldwell of Marquette will act as head line-man.

According to all advance dope Creighton is due for another trimming. A year ago the Methodists beat the Blue and White by a single touchdown and this year they may repeat. Coach Harry Miller of the Creighton team asserts that he is dubious of the outcome. The Creighton squad is in poor condition. Roy Platz, who has starred in all the games to date, will be out of the play with a large bell on his neck.

The absence of Platz will make a shifting of the backfield necessary. Warner will play right half and Coffey left. Wise has been shifted from tackle to fullback, due to the accident which put Stefan out of the game.

Tamies was not in a suit Friday evening, due to an attack of stomach trouble, and may not be able to play. Carrig will play quarter, while Shannon will fill Wise's tackle. Earhart will play right end.

Wesleyan Is Confident.

Coach Kline and his Wesleyan pluckers chasers have every confidence in their ability to down the local squad. Their confidence is shown in the fact that they played Cotner university Thursday, but two days previous to the Creighton game. Coach Kline asserts that Wesleyan made a wretched showing.

Wesleyan has every reason to expect a victory if the weights of the players speak for anything. Wesleyan has always been noted for the number of corn-foes it could trot onto the gridiron, and this year is no exception. The squad which will start the game averages 151 pounds, which is three pounds heavier than the Creighton lineup, which averages 179 pounds.

The Methodists have a young Goliath in Lish, right guard, who weighs 355. He will be pitted against Tamies, and it could not be ascertained whether or not the Jap had his attack of stomach trouble before or after learning Lish's weight.
