The Geramns made a grave error, it is derived from their unexpected advance, which would have enabled them to approach within eight miles of Warsaw without their presence being known.

German Attack Delayed. For unknown reasons the Germans suddenly decided to delay the attack until morning, which allowed the Siberian other Russian reinforcements to protect the city adequately. Papers found in the possession of German officers indicate that the general plan was to attack Warsaw that night. One explanation for the change in the plan is that the Germans failed to obtain the assistance of the Polish element upon which they had counted.

The Russian generals also admire the German's abrupt extrication when they found themselves outflanked, their retreat being so complete and precipitate that the Russians were unable to overtake and engage the rear guard in action for several miles. The whole affair including the whirlwind advance and retreat at present is a puzzle to the Rus-

Total of Eight Hundred Million Dollars Has Been Paid to Fund.

WOMAN TELLS A FALSE STORY

English Governess Is Sentenced to Prison for Making Allegation German Soldiers Attacked and Injured Stater.

BERLIN, Oct. 27 .- (via wireless.)-Information given out in official quarters in Berlin today as follows:

"A total of 3,300,000,000 marks (\$800,000,-000) has been paid in on the German war loan, although the loan itself was for only 2,606,000,000 marks (\$650,000,000.) The latest returns of the Imperial bank show specie to the amount of 1,828,000,000 marks (\$457.000,000), an increase of 27,000,000 marks (\$4,750,000).

Notes in circulation show a decrease of 94,000,000 marks (\$23,500,000) up to Oc-

TEUTONS ALLIES **ENGAGING MAIN** ARMY OF RUSSIA

Official Report from Vienna Says Combined Armies Are Holding Strong Positions on Line.

FIGHTING AT MANY POINTS

Austrian Offensive in Galicia Compels Czar to Send More Men Into This Territory.

RETREAT INTO EAST PRUSSIA

Inhabitants Are Said to Have Been Ordered to Retire Into Interior -Railroads Strewn with Austrian Corpses.

BERLIN,- (Monday, Oct. 26, by wireless to Sayville, Oct. 27.)-An official Austrian war butletin, given out in Berlin today, says that combined Austrian and German forces hold strong positions in the long and almost continuous battle line from Stry and Sambor, in Galicia, thence to a point east of Przemysl and along the San river, in a straight line to Plozk, in Russian Poland.

The main Russian army is being engaged. The Austrian orfensive beyond the Carpathians has compelled the Russians to send reinforcements into this territory.

The battle still is raging in central Galicia. Austrian troops have been the southeast of Przemysl. Vigorous encounters are proceeding between Ivangorod and Warsaw.

War Summary

The unwielding German line, which for six weeks has been stretched across France, is said by the French war office to have been broken at last. Near the eastern end of the line, in the region beyond Nancy, yesterday's French official statement reports the invaders have been driven back onto German soil. All other points over the long line the offensive has been resumed by the allied forces after a long period of comparative inaction.

The French claim to have won the advantage in an engagement at the point where the line sweeps eastwards, less than sixty miles from Parls. Between Solssons. and Berre, Au-Bac to the east of the bend in the line, heavy artillery fighting has been resumed. Apparently the engagement was limited to an artillery duel, the entrenched positions of the opposing forbidding the use of infan-

To the northward, along the Franco-Belgian border, the fighting continues with undiminished ferocity. Along the Yser, where the struggle had been most intense, the allies have not drawn back, says the French official statement, while toward the south further progress has been made between Ypres and Roulers.

As reports filter in from the scene of fighting along the North Sea, supplementing the unemotional official statement, it became evident yesterday that recent battles along the shore of the North Sea have been the most terrible of the war. From Emperor William himself, it is said. came the order that the German advance down the coast must be continued at any cost, and that Calais must be taken. The desperate assaults which followed, particularly along the Yser canal, have few precedents in modern military history.

British newspaper correspondents estimate that some 5,000 Germans succeeded in forcing their way across the canal. They did it at a frightful cost. Into a haff storm of shrapnel and shot the Germans charged night after night, only to be cut down by the thousands until the canal was clogged at points with their bodles. Those who succeeded in forcing their way across came to death grips with their waiting adversaries, and with rifle shot and bayonet, the struggle went on. Of the Germans who crossed the Yser, according to British reports,

few escaped alive. All reports agree that the lighting in the east continues without decisive result. The French official statement says that on the river San and south of Przemysl the Russian offensive is becoming more accentuated."

Latest Austrian communications state that the main Russian army is being engaged and that minor successes have been won by the Germans and Austrians, From Petrograd no report had come up to early afternoon.

PARIS, Oct. 27 .- (2:44 p. m.) -The French official announcement given out this afternoon says that spirited fighting continues between the mouth of the Yser and Lens; that in this district the allies have not drawn back, and that they have continued to advance in the region between Ypres and Roulers and else-

where. The text of the communication

follows: "The fighting continues to be particularly spirited between the mouth of the Yeer and the region of Lens. In this part of the front the ailied forces have at no point drawn back and they have continued to make progress in the region between Ypres and Roulers. In the general region between Soissons and Berry-Au-Bac an artillery engagement resulted in our advantage and resulted in the destruction of several batteries of

the enemy. "In the region to the east of Nancy between the forest of Bezange and the forest of Parroy, we have assumed the offensive and have driven the enemy across the frontier."
