Savings Made by Ure Runs Into Big Money. County Treasurer W. G. Ure, republican candidate for re-election, says: "In thirty-three months the office has received for \$3,000,000 and disbursed nearly \$31,000,000. It has had on hand most of the time \$2,500,000. It is a lot of money. The old way was to keep the money on deposit in banks at 2 per cent interest. The new way I have practiced is to withdraw the money from banks and invest it in water bonds, Douglas county and Omaha city and school bonds and warrants and so earn 4 1/2 per cent interest. The earnings and savings made for the public treasury in this way have amounted to \$50,000 a year—\$150,000 in three years. The new practice indulged in the next two years will save and earn \$100,000 more."

Patterson Expects to Council's Action

D. C. Patterson insists an injustice was done him in the statement made at the city council meeting that in selling a lot at Seventh and Dorcas streets he retained two feet with the idea of getting the street narrowed, and thus securing another corner lot.

"The facts are," says Mr. Patterson, "I did not retain the two feet, but sold it to the purchaser at the time, who purchased the forty feet and agreed to convey the two feet plus the narrowed portion of the street to give the purchaser the corner frontage. The city commissioners seem to have a grudge against me, for they admit the street should be narrowed, but refuse the request of the petitioners."

WESTERN UNION OPENS WIRELESS TO GERMANY

After suspension of commercial communication with Germany and Austria since the war started the Western Union Telegraph and Cable company has now arranged for re-establishment of communication with those countries by wireless. The Tuckerton (N. J.) wireless station will be used, according to advice received by Local Manager Hyland. As the capacity is limited, precedence will be given government messages over commercial ones. Rules laid down for the acceptance of such business provide that the acceptance will go only at the risk of the sender. They must bear complete address and signature and must be strictly neutral in character and written in plain English. Official German messages will have to pass a government censor, who must be provided with the key to decipher all code.

MANY TEACHERS ARE COMING

Educators Over Nebraska Promise Presence at Coming Meeting. Many Packages Sent Forward by Express Tuesday.

IOWANS TO SWELL ASSEMBLY

Many of Those in Western Part of Hawkeye State Will Attend Convention During Three Days of Next Week.

Reports being received in every mail by the Omaha publicity bureau, indicate a record-breaking attendance for the annual meeting of the Nebraska State Teachers' association in Omaha November 4, 5 and 6.

Sixty-five teachers from the neighborhood of Grand Island alone, have announced their intention of coming. The small town of Wynot will send five and eighteen will come from Sutton. Beaver City's entire high school faculty and many grade teachers will attend. The delegations from Riverton, Oskaloa and many other towns will consist of almost the entire teaching force, according to advance letters from school superintendents. The Aurora school board has ordered all teachers there to attend the convention, if possible. Seward's entire teaching staff will come for two days, says Superintendent J. A. Woodard of that town.

Western Iowa will also help swell the attendance at the convention. Large delegations of visitors will come from Missouri Valley, Harlan, Council Bluffs and other nearby towns, a total of nearly 50, it is expected.

Prof. C. W. Pugsley, director of the agricultural extension bureau of the University of Nebraska, writes that a strong delegation will come from the faculty of the university, including a score of the most prominent professors. Some of the university normal seniors will also come up for a day or two. Many of the faculty and students at the state normal schools are also planning to be present and altogether fully 5,000 people are expected this year.

The local committee will meet at the Commercial club Saturday at noon to perfect arrangements for the reception of the teachers. Information bureaus will be maintained at the Union station and the Burlington depot, at the Rome hotel and the association building. Buffalo and Principal John F. Matthes of the Grand Island high school will have charge of the registration, which starts Monday. All teachers will be required to register in person.

The committee has adopted the monogram prepared by Miss Alice Little of the Omaha schools for the official badge of the association.
