

WARIE MIK BACK FROM PARIS

Has Little Difficulty in Getting Out of France.

PARIS NO LONGER A GAY CITY

Flasks of London Filled with Soldiers Being Prepared to Be Sent to the Front to Meet the Germans.

Joe Mik, Burlington passenger director, has returned from New York, where he went to accompany home his daughter, Miss Marie, who for the last year has been studying music in Europe...

While Miss Mik was not in the heart of the war zone she was close enough so that she saw the results and felt the effects. Said Miss Mik: "I left Paris October 15 and two days later sailed from Liverpool for Liverpool."

"Paris is feeling the effects of the war and has lost most of its gay life. The stores and shops, or at least a great many of them, are closed, and I was told that there was little business, people buying only the necessities of life."

Expect Long War. "The French people expect that the war will be of long duration, but feel certain that in the end the allies will be victorious. They are not discouraged in the least and assert that the Germans will never reach Paris."

"I had little trouble in getting from Paris to London, the train service being practically uninterrupted. However, for a time it looked as if I might have some difficulty in getting out of England. I was searched and put through a thorough examination, physical and mental, the officers seeming to think I was a German spy."

"In both Paris and London you don't hear as much about the war as here in the United States. The papers print few details and generally it is not talked very freely on the streets. The voyage across the ocean was without incident, with the exception that all lights on the vessel were out until we nearly reached New York."

Mother Swears Out Habeas Corpus for Married Daughter

A mother's complaint that her 17-year-old daughter was married without her consent, although under age, and since the wedding eight days ago has been prohibited from seeing her parents by the woman who gave alleged false information to the clerk of the county court in order to secure a marriage license for the girl, was involved in a habeas corpus hearing before Judge English in criminal court.

Nelle Downing was the subject of the habeas corpus writ. The mother, Mrs. Thomas E. Downing, 199 Pacific street, alleged that the girl's husband, O. E. Gerock, 215 South 24th street, is an Omaha box factory employe, and Mrs. Downing declared Mrs. Shaw has practically held the girl a prisoner, and has refused to allow the mother to see her. Deputy Sheriff Proger brought the girl, her husband and the Shaw couple into court.

M'CLELLAN GETS LIBERTY ON LEGAL TECHNICALITY

After being arrested and held in the Douglas county jail on the request of Sheriff Frank Noonan of Deadwood, S. D., who held a requisition on the charge of embezzlement, George D. McClellan has secured his liberty on a technicality. He first got a lawyer to start habeas corpus proceedings, but to check that, the local authorities arraigned him in Justice Britt's court on a charge of being a fugitive from justice. It developed that McClellan's alleged embezzlement from the Spanish War veterans of Deadwood amounted to only \$25, so McClellan was discharged, and the writ of habeas corpus was quashed in district court, as Sheriff Noonan had no other charge to bring against the man.

NO APPEAL TO OMAHA BANKS

Fund for Cotton Loan Not Yet Asked of Local Institutions.

CANNOT SEE THE WAY CLEAR Even Should Assistance Be Asked Here They Doubt Whether Any Substantial Help Could Be Given. Omaha bankers have not yet received the official appeal from the federal reserve board for funds to be used as a cotton loan fund to relieve the cotton situation in the south. They have been notified by the Washington dispatches that the reserve board is planning to make a big loan to the cotton growers of the south—with money subscribed by the bankers throughout the north and the south, the loan to be secured by cotton in bale in the warehouses of the south. This is to tide the southern grower while they are unable to sell most of the cotton crop in Europe, where they usually market the bulk of it.
