The tissues grow by a continual process of cell multiplication and this is accompanied by a continual shedding of the If the growth of the new cells is rapid, and tehy unite cleanly with the old, the mark of the new flesh will soon disappear and we shall see no sign of the scar.

If the wound does not heat clean, that is if the edges do not unite evenly together or if any dirt or infection gets in it will be a long time before the scar disappears. In such a case I recommend a quickening of the circulation in the tiny capillaries that feed the skin by hot application followed by a massage with a good skin food or massage cream.
