Republican Candidate Carries Empire State by Heavy Plurality.

TAMMANY ADMITS DEFEAT

Early Returns Show Gotham District Attorney Elected Governor.

HAS BIG LEAD IN STATE

Has Over Sixty Thousand to Good Outside of Gotham.

DOUGLAS GIVES MOREHEAD LEAD

Early Returns from Heavy Vote Show the Governor Far Ahead of Howell.

SUFFRAGE PROBABLY LOSES

Other Results of Voting as Indicated by Few Returns at Hand—No Figures at Present Definite.

A fairly heavy vote was cast in Douglas county yesterday; the count was started early and, so far as it has progressed, it indicates that Governor Morehead has carried the county by a good round plurality over R. B. Howell, the republican candidate.

Only a few precincts had been counted when this edition of The Bee went to press, but those give Morehead a commanding lead. They are:

BRYAN'S PRECINCT SHOWS DEM GAIN

Voting Over Nebraska Heavy—Interest Greatest of "G" Governor and Suffrage.

MUCH STRETCHING OF BALLOTS

Unusually Large Vote Cast in Many Places—Morehead Gains on Early Figures Received.

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Nov. 3.—(Special Telegram.)—One precinct, Grand Island gives: Morehead, 123; Howell, 115; Sackett, 11. Two years ago the same precinct gave: Aldrich, 120; Morehead, 307.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 3.—(Special Telegram.)—A fairly heavy vote was cast and much scratching of ballots was done. It is hard to give much of an idea on the vote, although it is the opinion that Morehead has polled a good vote in the city. The first returns to come in were from Mr. Bryan's home precinct which gave Morehead, 55; Howell, 85, and Sackett, 2. This precinct is normally democratic by a small majority, though if the balance of the county precincts shows like gains for Morehead he will carry Lancaster by a good majority.

BEATRICE, Neb., Nov. 3.—(Special Telegram.)—An unusually large vote was polled at the election here today and it is a difficult matter to predict results this evening. The vote is close on the head of the ticket and a big vote is also being polled on the suffrage question, but it is believed the proposition will lose by probably 600 in Gage county.

The county ticket is being badly scratched, and indications are that the democrats will succeed in landing two of the officers.
City schools closed today to allow teachers to attend the state meeting at Omaha.

Scratching in Dodge.
FREMONT, Neb., Nov. 3.—(Special Telegram.)—In all 120 votes were cast here today, which is a goodly number. Woman's suffrage designations at each of the polling places in the city handed out slips. It seems to be the general opinion that the proposed amendment will have a large majority in the city, there having been a great change in public sentiment within the last three days.

Stevens is running strong for congress and getting a big republican support. Very few straight tickets were cast and the results except on the head of the ticket will not be known tonight. The vote on university removal will be very close.

Heavy Vote in Hall.
GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Nov. 3.—(Special Telegram.)—A very heavy vote was cast. There was more than the usual scratching in the city, which promises to cast over 2,000 votes. The governor was probably favored by a liberal number of republicans. Congressman Barton has been at home only two days, and faced a very active hostile organization.

The woman's suffrage organization has made a very active fight, but faces a large German opposition, the German-American alliance doing united work in opposition, and the suffragists have hoped only to keep the majority as low as possible.

The legislative ticket will be mixed according to general belief.

Great Interest in Suffrage.
KEARNEY, Neb., Nov. 3.—(Special Telegram.)—Woman's suffrage created the greatest interest on the ballot at today's election in this city and from indications it is believed it will carry in this city.

Committees from the local association met voters at the polls with their plea for equality. The full vote was brought out and clerks have been kept busy during the day.

On state officers no winners could be picked, it being evident that the race will be close between republican and democratic tickets.

Kaiser Says New German-Roman Empire Most Splendid in History

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Copenhagen correspondent of the Evening News says that a German subject who heard Emperor William on a recent occasion when he addressed his troops, quotes his majesty as follows:
"We are now fighting for the life of Germany. They wish to kill Germany, but I say if we win—and we must win—a new empire shall arise more splendid than the world ever saw—a new Roman-German empire, which shall rule the world, and the world shall be happy."
The Star publishes a dispatch from its Petrograd correspondent, dated November 3, in which he says that the Russians are now securely established inside the East Prussian frontier.

Workers Electioneering for Suffrage Meet with General Courtesy from Men.

BOOST FOR CITIZEN TICKET
Majority of the Fair Sex Passing Out Literature Show Decided Tendency Toward that Element for School Board.

General courtesy featured the attitude shown women workers who were electioneering for and against the suffrage amendment around the polls yesterday. There were a few little arguments between some of the more contentious spirits, but on the whole the local situation was markedly peaceful. Among both the anti and the pro there was a general tendency toward the citizen's ticket for the school board members.

Several times during the day Miss Thompson addressed groups of men which formed when they heard her discussing voters for women with a prospective suffragist.

Women Wrathful.
Both women were particularly wrathful toward "Boon" Milder of the Third ward, with whom they had several fights during the day. "Otherwise the men were most courteous," said Mrs. Bee.

On Duty Twenty-Four Hours.

BRITISH SUCCEED MAKING TRANSFER

Swinton of English Staff Tells of Move from Alsace to North-eastern France.

DO IT WITHOUT ANY NOISE
Troops Silently Withdraw and Because There is No Spectacle Arr Said to Have Misled the German Forces.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Another eyewitness account from the battle front in France and Belgium, written by Cole D. Swinton of the intelligence department of the British general staff, was given out today.

The narrative gives an account of a remarkable transfer during the course of a great battle of British troops from the Alsace river to northeastern France, where the battle of the Yser is now progressing.

"This transfer," says the account, "can best be compared with the action of the Japanese during the battle of Mukden, when General Oku withdrew a portion of his force from his front, moved it northward behind the line and threw it into the fight again near the extreme left of the Japanese armies."

What was implied in the actual withdrawal from contact with the enemy along the Alsace front, the evacuation of the trenches, the retirement to the river below, the crossing of the river over railway plank roadways which were mostly commanded by the enemy's guns, and the climbing to the top of the plateau on the south side.

War Summary

The apology of Turkey for the assaults of its fleet on Russian ports on the Black Sea has not accomplished its purpose. Both Russia and Great Britain have undertaken active military measures against it and hostilities have begun in the Red Sea.

In France, the troops of Emperor William, frustrated in their persistent endeavors to advance along the coast, are now seeking a route more to the south, and the fighting in Flanders is going on with determination on part of the allies and heavy onslaughts from the enemy.

Fighting is reported between Russian and Turkish troops near Trebizond; a British cruiser has shelled and occupied the Turkish fortified town of Akabah on the Red Sea, in Arabia. It is announced in a news dispatch that Emperor Nicholas has ordered his Caucasian army to cross the frontier and attack the Turks; the Turkish ambassador has left the Russian capital; the Russian foreign minister has replied to the Porte that negotiations are now impossible.

Flanders still shows a continuance of hard fighting, always attended with heavy losses on both sides, as the allies maintain their apparently successful resistance to the German efforts to advance toward French ports on the English channel.

Lord Kitchener, the British secretary for war, was in Dunkirk Sunday night, and was in conference with President Poincare of France and M. De Broqueville, prime minister of Belgium.

The Germans last Sunday, according to news dispatches, made a supreme effort to capture Ypres. Emperor William, himself, was present, according to news dispatches, at the last attempt to capture this important position. German forces have left Bruges for Courtrai, twenty-five miles to the south and eighteen miles east of Ypres, where the British hold the line. This is to indicate the selection of another way to reach Calais.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The British submarine D-5 was sunk in the North Sea early this morning by a mine which was thrown out by a German cruiser retreating before British cruisers.

Two officers and two men of the submarine were saved. This information is contained in an admiralty report issued here tonight.

VALPARAISO, Chile, Nov. 3.—The German warships Gneisenau, Scharnhorst, Nürnberg, Leipzig and Dresden today attacked the British fleet off Coronel, Chile. The British cruiser Monmouth was sunk. The cruiser Good Hope was very badly damaged, and as it was on fire it is supposed to have been lost.

Fleet of Five of Kaiser's Vessels Attacks Warships of England and Battle Ensues.
