RACE IS BETWEEN SHERMAN AND DEM

Sullivan Needs Every Chicago Vote He Claims to Beat Republican.

LATTER WINNING IN STATE Robbins Defeated, is Apparent on Face of Returns Coming in Early in the Evening.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Sullivan will need every vote of his maximum claim of 100,000 plurality in Cook county to win the United States senatorship in the unlikely event that Sherman's plurality in the republican stronghold in the northern tier of Illinois counties is maintained. The first fifty-four precincts outside of Cook county heard from give Sherman, the republican candidate, 1,946 plurality. At this rate he would come into Cook county with 100,000 plurality, but democratic managers point out that the more southerly counties, in which the democrats rely, were yet to be heard from at 7:30 o'clock. The same returns indicate the decisive defeat of Robbins, progressive, by a vote much less than that given Roosevelt two years ago.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Medill McCormick, progressive national committeeman from Illinois, at 6:40 o'clock admitted that Sullivan would carry Cook county by 40,000. The returns indicated that he had carried the entire county ticket, with him by pluralities ranging from 20,000 to 40,000. Sullivan's managers claimed the county by 60,000 to 100,000. Returns from 242 precincts out of 1,708 in Cook county give: Sullivan, democrat, 22,552; Sherman, republican, 11,079; Robbins, progressive, 11,079.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—The city news bureau, which is tabulating police returns of the election, estimated that on the face of early returns Roger Sullivan for United States senator will carry Cook county (Chicago) by 60,000 plurality. Robbins, progressive, is running a close third to Sherman, republican.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—First returns from the Eighteenth congressional district were from the Second precinct of the Fourth ward of Danville, which gave O'Hair E. Cannon 45 and Kay E. O'Hair 2. CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Thirty-four precincts out of 2,738 in Illinois outside of Cook county in the senatorial race give: Sullivan, 1,732; Sherman, 2,919; Robbins, 1,386. The same precincts in 1912 gave: Wilson, 2,181; Taft, 1,702; Roosevelt, 4,389.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—The first five precincts heard from in Chicago on senator give Sullivan (dem.), 842; Sherman (rep.), 477; and Robbins (prog.), 390. CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Sullivan vote shows an impressive lead in 102 precincts out of 1,569 in Chicago: Sullivan (dem.), 9,513; Sherman (rep.), 5,317; Robbins (prog.), 4,840. The precincts are scattered all over the city and at Sullivan headquarters were declared faithfully indicative of the result in this city.

Four Companies Fifth Cavalry Ordered Into Arkansas Strike Zone

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—Secretary Garrison today ordered four companies of the Fifth United States cavalry from Fort Sheridan, Ill., to Fort Smith, Ark., to maintain order in the Hartford Valley coal strike district. Major Nathaniel F. McClure, who has been with the troops in the Colorado mining fields, will command the force.

Federal Judge Youmans has reported he is unable to enforce his order in the strike zone where mining properties are in the hands of receivers appointed by the United States court, and that the deputy marshals have been unable to cope with the situation. It is the first time in many years that the judicial branch of the government has called upon the military to assist in enforcing its orders.

Wife Captures Bonus. Note for ball players' wives who are looking for a chance to earn pin money: A story from Colorado has it that Ed Kline's wife was given a "bonus" of \$1,000 for inducing her husband to sign with the Reds.

Mann Is Re-elected By Good Majority

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Republicans in the new lower house of congress will retain their old leader, James H. Mann. His campaign manager, Edwin W. Sims, stated that he would have a majority over his progressive and democratic opponents of well over 3,000.

SHIPLOAD OF TOYS COMES FROM GERMANY

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The Dutch steamer Oosterdyk, Santa Claus ship from the toy makers of Germany and Switzerland to the United States, reached New York today laden with toys, crockery and song birds. There were 15,000 canary birds.

Canada Extends Embargo. OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—Because of the spread of foot and mouth disease Canada has extended the embargo against American cattle to Illinois and Pennsylvania. Previously it applied only to cattle from Michigan and Indiana.

BRITISH SHIPS SUNK BY GERMANS OFF CHILE COAST

with two eighteen-inch torpedo tubes. Its complement was 655 men. The Monmouth was built in 1895.

The Good Hope, also reported lost, was the flagship of the squadron. It was 500 feet long, seventy-one feet beam and displaced 14,000 tons. It represented the British nation at the Jamestown exposition in 1907. Its armament consisted of two 9.2-inch guns, sixteen six-inch guns, fourteen three-inch guns, three three-pounders and two eighteen-inch torpedo tubes. It had a complement of 900 men. The Good Hope was built thirteen years ago.

The light cruiser Glasgow, which took refuge at Coronel, was built in 1908. It was 430 feet long, forty-seven feet beam and displaced 4,820 tons. It had a complement of 374 men. Its armament consisted of two six-inch guns and ten four-inch guns. It was equipped with two eighteen-inch torpedo tubes.

Sir Christopher Craddock, who commanded the squadron, was in charge of the British fleet in Mexican waters at the time American marines occupied Vera Cruz.

Glasgow Damaged. SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 3.—The British cruiser Glasgow is also reported to have been badly damaged in a naval battle off Coronel.

visior does not hold out, in the opinion of London, any hope for a peaceful outcome of the dispute.

Battle Rolls Back from Coast. The tumult of battle has rolled back from the Belgian coast and after the apparent failure of their fierce assault on the British and Belgian lines around Ypres, the Germans evidently are diverting their attack toward a more southerly point.

Much activity on the part of the German mobile columns is reported from Belgium and there is evidence that the invaders have not exhausted all the resources which are being brought to bear in the campaign to cut their way through to Calais.

The German assault at Ypres is believed by London observers to have been repulsed decisively. But this has been at a terrible cost to the British army, which apparently has suffered as severely as the Belgian forces.

Concerning the situation along the river Aisne the reports from Berlin and from Paris are sharply contradictory. The Germans declare they have made distinct progress, while the French assert that all the German assaults have failed completely.

More Fighting in East.

In the eastern arena the Russian right wing, which rests on the frontier of East Prussia, evidently has been sustaining determined attacks from the Germans. In the meantime the Austrians, hundreds of miles away, still threaten the Russian left wing. Reports of the fall of Przemysl are declared by Petrograd to be premature and due to capture of 4,000 men of the Przemysl garrison, together with a large amount of arms and equipment, when a sortie was attempted.

The safe arrival of the White Star line steamer Olympic at Belfast has caused much relief here. The detention of this vessel at Lough Swilly, in the north of Ireland, gave rise to many rumors of disaster to the great liner and its narrow escape from the mine field has brought home to the English imagination the grave danger from this source. Today the drastic mine policy of the British admiralty is meeting with general approval. The new mine regulations virtually close the North Sea. Navigation, which normally follows the North Sea routes will be diverted to the English channel.

Iowa News Notes. HAMILTON—The Danish Lutheran congregation of this city is erecting a fine new edifice. The building covers a space of about one-quarter of a block and will be one of the finest churches in the state. It will be built upon the building lot high.

Garranza Refuses to Recognize the Convention's Act

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 3.—General Carranza, in a message received here this afternoon declared that he would not abide by the action of the Aguas Calientes convention in naming a provisional president.

Carranza's statement as received by officials of the constitutionalist consular general's office here was telegraphed from Pueblo. It said: "The convention having not complied with the conditions that I fixed regarding my retirement from the duties I am performing as first chief, I have not taken into consideration the resolution of the said convention in regard to their appointment of a president who should take my place, and, therefore, I still continue to be in charge of my office. "This resolution of mine has been supported by the governors of the states. Among the officials joining in this action are Generals Cos, P. Sanchez, A. Gonzalez, Ernesto Santos Coy, Pablo Gonzalez and all leaders of the division of the northeast.

"I have no doubt that the balance of the leaders when they know of this resolution of mine will support my attitude and will ignore the convention."
