OMAHA CLUB WOMEN ACTIVE

Some Resent Insinuation They Are Working for Suffrage. CONSIDERABLE FEELING SHOWN as Suffrage Pass Out Cards While in Booth—Antis Are Charged with Hauling Voters to the Polls in Autos.

Omaha Woman's club members, some of them suffragists and some of them not, mingled their efforts for the citizens' ticket candidates for the Board of Education, with the suffragists. Mrs. C. B. Coon, standing perilously close to the 100-foot line at a Farnam street polling place, resented the insinuation that she was a suffragist. "I am working for the citizens' ticket," she declared.

Mrs. W. A. Wilson, who stood a few feet away was solicitous of Mrs. Coon's safety in coming so close to the voting place, and was deprecating the fact that she was not qualified to vote herself. Mrs. C. H. Marley, treasurer of the Woman's club, and Mrs. C. M. Bush were stationed on Eleventh and St. Mary's avenue. Both women deplrored the light vote of women in their precinct. They said some men had both-ered them all morning. "The antis ought to take pictures of their adherents," said Mrs. Marley. "They speak for themselves."

Chairs for Women Workers. While they were standing there, W. A. Hixenbaugh stepped out of his place of business and offered the women chairs, so that they need not stand all morning. The women accepted the offer with alacrity and he placed two chairs on the pavement.

Work in Election Booth. A report that the suffrage poll workers were invading the election booths to electioneer for their cause, came from the Third district of the Ninth ward, the Bemis Park polling place. Mrs. J. W. Crumpacker, Miss Marjorie Dorman and Mrs. Frank Hamilton hurried out there in an auto to investigate the matter. They found that several suffragists had entered the booth to vote for school board candidates, and had then passed out suffrage cards and talked "votes for women" while still in the polling place.

To counteract the charge that suffragists were violating the law by electioneering for their cause in polling places, the suffrage leaders alleged that anti-suffragist workers were hauling voters to the polls. The charge arose from the fact that in the second district of the Third ward, near the Farnam hotel, a man who drove up to the polling place in his auto with a friend, happened to be wearing a button inscribed "Opposed to woman suffrage."
