Des Moines National and German Savings Consolidate.

REYNOLDS DISPOSES OF STOCK

Former Head of American Bankers' Association Will Go in with Brother in Chicago Bank.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 4.—(Special Telegram)—An important financial deal has just been consummated between the Des Moines National bank and the German Savings bank whereby they will come practically under one management. This is due to the fact that Arthur Reynolds, who was last year president of the American Bankers' association, has taken a position with a Chicago bank and has sold all his bank stock in the national bank to Messrs. Cavanaugh and Hogan of the German Savings bank.

No Surprise.

The news of the quarantine of the Chicago stock yards caused no surprise to the state veterinary department here. Dr. Gibson had been over in Indiana and Michigan and had gone through the section infected with the foot and mouth disease and had assisted in some of the work being done there. He came back a few days ago and issued a warning to the Iowa people to be on the lookout. He has received word from the secretary of the Live Stock Sanitary association that 154 herds had been infected, of which sixty-six had been killed and others will soon be disposed of. It is the plan of the government to stamp it out, if possible, by completely destroying all infected herds, and the quarantine is as rigid as it is possible to make it. The closing of the Chicago stock yards will be a large aid to prevention of the westward movement of the disease, according to Dr. Gibson.

Expect Decision.

Now that the eastern advanced rate case has been for a third time submitted to the Interstate Commerce commission

It is expected a decision will be rendered very quickly.

Mr. Thorne, who presented the main argument at the conclusion in opposition to the rate raise, is in Washington to argue another case tomorrow, that involving the valuation of live stock in the shipping contracts. But the arguments were quickly over in the main rate case, and it is believed here that despite the pressure of the administration in favor of the rate raise it will not be granted, at least not in the form it has been presented to the commission.

Mutual Insurance Associations.

The annual meeting of the Association of Mutual Insurance Associations of Iowa will be held in Des Moines, commencing November 13. C. W. Hunt of Logan is president of the association. There will be an address by H. P. Cooper of Indiana, secretary of the national association. One of the principal topics of discussion will be the matter of rate fixing and discrimination. Warren Carr, industrial commissioner, and Ole Ros, state fire marshal, will speak.

To Argue Gas Rate Case.

H. W. Byers, city corporation counsel, left tonight for Washington, D. C., to argue the 50-cent gas rate case before the supreme court. He prepared the Myrtle resolution providing that the city council call an election on the street car franchise. The resolution will be introduced Wednesday.

Seek Annulment of Marriage.

Reuben M. Oliver today filed through his attorney, H. L. Bump, suit for the annulment of the marriage contract to Maggie A. Oliver, charging that he had never been legally wedded. He also filed an amendment to his answer and cross bill against her suit for divorce. The marriage contract between the two was entered into September 23, 1911.

AMES, Ia., Nov. 4.—(Special)—Kansas and Nebraska universities yesterday notified Director Clyde Williams that they would have their cross-country teams here next Saturday to run in the Missouri Valley conference cross-country, which will be run off just before the whistle for the Ames-Cornell football game. Missouri will have the Tiger team here, which was beaten 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6 by the Cyclone sextet in the dual run over the Columbia paved course. The date of the Missouri-Ames game, Director Williams has not heard from Drake, Washington or the Kansas Aggies, but previous correspondence with the Jayhawkers indicated that they would have a team started.

The race will start in front of the new concrete bleachers on State field between 1:30 and 1:45, allowing thirty minutes for the field to be cleared of the last runner, and pull up to the finish at the starting point, the Cornell game commencing at 2:30 o'clock.
