

### Grain Men Learn Reason of the Slow Southern Demands

Local grain dealers have at last found the solution as to the reason southern ports, such as New Orleans and Galveston, are not clamoring for Nebraska wheat. The solution of the problem is the fact that Gulf cities are receiving export wheat from the fields of Kansas and Oklahoma at a rate 2 1/2 cents cheaper than the Nebraska dealers can supply the commodity. This is partially due to cheaper transportation rates owing to a lesser distance and to the fact that the crop of the two states mentioned has been unusually good this year. As a result Baltimore and cities of the Atlantic coast are the only ports demanding the local product.

Woo, general manager of the Han Yank Iron works of Han Yank, China, has left San Francisco with six other Chinese men for a trip to New York and cities of the east where a general inspection of the big steel industries will be made, relative to negotiating contracts for the new Chinese government railroad which will extend from the east coast of China to the borders of Tibet. ### WOMEN PAY \$130 TAXES TO QUALIFY AS VOTERS

Woman's suffrage brought about \$130 into the county treasury. The women desiring to vote, who had not previously paid taxes, scheduled personal property aggregating about \$7,000. Seventy-four women of Douglas county went before County Assessor Cunneman and made affidavit that they owned property and had not been assessed. Then they went to the county treasurer, paid their taxes and went onto the regular tax list. Generally the property scheduled by the women was \$50 each, the minimum required by law to make them eligible to vote for members of the Board of Education. The one scheduling the largest amount of property was Mrs. Minnie Wilson, \$2,000, and the next, Miss Frances Graves, \$500.

### Two Men Drown When Auto Plunges in River at Yankton

YANKTON, S. D., Nov. 4.—(Special Telegram.)—Editor H. W. Cooley of the Crofton Journal of Crofton, Neb., and O. W. Cass, druggist, in the latter's car, were drowned in the Missouri river at 2 a. m. today, when the car left the pontoon bridge and plunged into the river.

Cass, who was married, was driving his car. O. D. Bailey, a barber, and L. S. Ross, jeweler, were in the car and went to the bottom of the river with the car. They freed themselves and reached shore exhausted and nearly drowned. Speed is given as the cause of the accident. The bodies of the drowned men are still in the river under twelve feet of water and fifty feet from the shore. Investigation of the tragedy awaits the arrival of the sheriff of Cedar county, from Hartington, Neb., Mr. Cooley was a Mason.

### Autoists Decide on Time of State Meet

At the monthly meeting of the Omaha Automobile club official notice was given of the coming on November 17 of the Nebraska Automobile association convention, to be held at the Rome hotel. Reports showed the local club to have 216 members in good standing, besides nineteen honorary. Fifty delinquents were ordered stricken from the club rolls. One hundred and fifty danger signs have arrived and will be put up in this county within the next two weeks. The secretary reported \$55.44 on hand and \$1.00 paid out within the last six months for road signs, markers and securing the arrest and conviction of parties throwing glass on the roads.
