## **YON KLUCK DIES IN** NAMUR HOSPITAL

Death of Noted German General is Said to Have Occurred Ten Days Ago.

CAUSED BY WOUND IN HEAD

News Has Been Carefully Concealed from Germans and Belgians-

PARIS, Nov. 5 .- The correspondent of the Excelsior at Havre says he has from a source which he cannot designate, news of the death of General Von Kluck, ter days ago in a hospital at Namur, where he was treated for a wound in the head The news of the alleged death, the correspondent says, has been carefully concealed in Belgium and Germany.

General Von Kluck, who led the dash of the German right wing, which got to within a few miles of Paris in the first month of the fighting, has been reported within the last few days in official communications as directing his army in the fight on the Alene river. When the scene of fighting shifted to Belgium and the German right wing was extended into that territory, General Von Kluck, following his skillful retreat from the vicinity of Paris, remained in the position he had taken on the Aisne. The fighting there recently has been overshadowed by the operations in Belgium, and General Von Kluck and his army, according to reports, have been given a much needed

The secretary told the president that as a result of the epidemic it will be necessary to increase the estimates of expenditures for the department now being drawn up and which will be sent to congress next month. He said the department believed it was in control of the situation, and that the food supply would not be very seriously affected.

Prices Rise in Kansas City. KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. &-Higher prices provailed at the Kansas City stock yards today due to the quarantine at Chicago. Cattle and hogs were 15 to 25 cents a hundred higher and sheep were up from 50 to 75 cents a hundred pounds Receipts were normal for Thursday. Much of the demand was for shipping. Government officials at the stock yards today issued orders that, beginning this afternoon, that all cars must be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected before shipments are made.

Big Increase at St. Joseph. ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Nov. 5 .- There was a farge increase in the receipts of hogs at the St. Joseph stock yards today and the prices were \$5 cents higher, due, dealers said, to the quarantine at Chicago.
