These were accompanied by another sharp rise in Transatlantic rates, while war risks on ships piving between North and South American ports were virtually prohibitive according to reports.

Expiration of the British moratorium was without appreciable effect either in London or here Albeit the London Stock exchange has formulated, with government aid, an elaborate plan to be employed when market operations are resumed.

The plan applies mainly to the carrying of margined accounts.

The weekly statement of the Imperial bank of Germany which showed an increase of \$120,000,000 in gold reserves in the three months of war, reflected the large payments made in connection with the war loan. Foreign exchange was firm with a minimum of operations, cables being quoted at 4.914 and sight drafts at 4.904. More German cotton bills were in the market at rates unchanged from the early week.
